# Safety and General Information

This section contains important information on the safe and efficient operation of your mobile device. Read this information before using your mobile device.1

## Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

Your Motorola mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

## **Operational Precautions**

For optimal mobile device performance and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions.

### External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user's guides published prior to May 1, 2006.

### **Product Operation**

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola, keep the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

When using any data feature of the mobile device, with or without an accessory cable, position the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body.

Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of Motorola-supplied or approved accessories, visit our Web site at: www.motorola.com.

## **RF Energy Interference/Compatibility**

Nearly every electronic device is subject to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

# Follow Instructions to Avoid Interference Problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so. These locations include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in flight.

### Pacemakers

If you have a pacemaker, consult your physician before using this device.

Persons with pacemakers should observe the following precautions:

- ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimeters (8 inches) from your pacemaker when the mobile device is turned ON.
- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.

This example shows that, from the home screen, you press 🔳 to open the menu, highlight and select **Recent Calls**, then highlight and select **Dialled Calls**.

Press  $\hat{\phi}$  to scroll to and highlight a menu feature. Press the **SELECT** key to select the highlighted menu feature.

**Note:** If you remove the battery for a long time, the phone will ask you to reset the time and date. If you choose to cancel or ignore, the time and date will be **affected**. You can input the correct time and date by:

# Find it: $\mbox{Press}$ $\blacksquare$ > Setting > Initial Setup > Time and Date

But, if you remove the battery just for a few seconds (e.g. quickly change SIM card), the system either won't ask you to reset the time and date or if prompted, you can choose **BACK** on the time and date screen, the clock will only be slightly affected.

# battery charging

Before you can use your phone, you need to completely charge the battery. New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the Mini-USB cord into your



phone and an electrical outlet or a PC. Your phone displays **Charge Complete** when finished.

Your Motorola phone may be charged via a PC USB port. Some PCs require driver software (which is not included in the box, but can be obtained at www.motorola.com to be loaded in order to provide charging. The actual charge rate is dependent on the capability for your PC and may take approximately 12 hours to completely charge your phone.

**Tip:** You cannot overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

## battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

- Always use Motorola Original<sup>™</sup> batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.

 It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.

for 2 seconds. If prompted, enter your SIM card PIN code and/or unlock code.



**Caution:** If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider.

To turn off your phone, press and hold () for 2 seconds.

# make a call

Enter a phone number and press 💿 to make a call.

To end the call, press 💿.

# answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, press (2) to answer.

To end the call, press 🕥.

You can also answer or end a call by pressing any key when the **Multi-key** answer option is activated.

To see your number:

To store or edit your name and number on your SIM card, press the **VIEW** key while displaying it. If you don't know your phone number, contact your service provider.

## send a multimedia message



A *Multimedia Messaging Service* (MMS) message contains pages with text and media objects (including photos, pictures, animations, or sounds). You can send the multimedia message to other phones with MMS.

Find it:  $\mbox{Press}$   $\blacksquare > \mbox{Messages} > \mbox{Create} > \mbox{SMS/EMS}, \mbox{MMS or MMS Templates}$ 

**Note:** The **MMS templates** can't be downloaded or expanded. You can only use the default templates.

1 Press keypad keys to enter text on the page. For details about text entry, see page 36.

To insert a **picture, sound, or other object** on the page, press **INSERT** or **()** > **Insert**. Select the file type and the file.

To insert another slide in the message, enter text objects on the current page and press 🗊 > Insert > Add Slide. You can enter more text and objects on the new page.

2 When you finish the message, press OK.

3 Choose one or more people for Send To.

To select a **contacts entry**, highlight the entry, and press **ADD**. Repeat to add other **Contacts** entries.

To **enter** a new number, highlight **[One Time Entry]** and press **SELECT.** 

To enter and store a new number, highlight [New Entry] > Number / Email and press SELECT. The entry can be saved in your SIM card or to your phone.

4 When you finish entering numbers/ addresses, press **DONE**. Your phone displays the message fields.

To enter a **subject** for the message, highlight **Subject** and press **CHANGE**.

To request a **delivery receipt** for the message, highlight **Receipt** and press **CHANGE**, then press **ADD**.

**5** To send the message, press **SEND**.

To cancel or save the message as a Draft, press  $\square$  > Save to Drafts.

6 To **cancel** the message, go to **Outbox**. If the message is still sending, highlight the message and press **()** > **Cancel**.

# receive a multimedia message



When you receive a multimedia message, your phone sounds an alert and displays **New Message** with a message indicator, such as

Press the **READ** key to open the message.

If a multimedia message contains media objects:

- photos, pictures, and animations will display as you read the message.
- sound files will play when its slide bar displays.

# chatting



Select Chat from the Extras menu to keep in touch with friends. You can save time by inserting a common phrase, such as  $\ln a$  meeting now or Take Care. Press NEW > Msg: > INSERT.

## camera

To activate your phone's camera using the menu system:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Multimedia > Camera

The active viewfinder image appears on your display.



### 24 main attractions

Point the camera lens at the photo subject, then:

- 1 Press CAPTURE to take a photo.
- 2 Press **STORE** to view storage options. If you choose to keep the photo, continue to step 4.
- **3** Press **DISCARD** to delete the photo and return to active viewfinder.
- 4 Scroll to Send in Message, Store Only, Apply as Wallpaper, Apply as Screen Saver or Apply as Contacts Entry and press SELECT.

**Note:** If the screen flickers when taking a picture, you may need to select an alternative frequency for the **Flicker** setting. For example, if the **Flicker** setting is currently 50Hz, switch to 60Hz, and try to take the picture again.

You can listen to and program up to nine of your favorite FM radio stations.

# turn on the FM radio

## Find it: Press 🗊 > Multimedia > FM Radio

The FM radio will automatically tune in the lowest available frequency when you use it for the first time. After that, it will tune in the frequency last used. Press •**ộ**• up and down or use the side volume key to increase or decrease the volume.



### 26 main attractions

Press Mute to make the output volume silent.

**Note:** The earpiece must be inserted into the phone for the FM radio to function. If you try to turn it on without inserting the earpiece, your phone will display **Please Insert The Earpiece**.

**Note:** The headset also acts as an antenna, so the FM Radio receiver performance is dependent on the type of headset device connected. If a non-Motorola 3.5 mm headset is connected to the phone through the adapter (2.5 - 3.5 mm), or the headset is curled up or kinked, performance may be affected.

## tune the FM radio

- 1 Press 🗊 > Multimedia and scroll to FM radio.
- 2 Press •¢• left or right to increase or decrease the frequency. Each keypress will increase or decrease the frequency by 0.05 MHz.
- 3 Press and hold ·ộ· left or right to activate the scanning feature. The FM radio will scan to the next usable frequency. You can continue scanning by pressing ·ộ· again. Press ► > Set Frequency to save the channel.

## use the radio presets

You can store up to nine preset radio stations.

## set the radio presets

- 2 Press and hold number keys to save that number as the preset.

### select a radio preset

Press number keys to select the corresponding radio preset.

# FM radio selection

You can manually set the radio frequency and display or edit the frequency list.

## set frequency



- 1 Press 🗊 and scroll to Set Frequency. Press SELECT.
- 2 Use the number keys to enter the desired frequency. Press ∉ to enter a decimal point. Second decimal number can only be 0 or 5.
- 3 Press OK.

# display or edit the channel list

- 3 Use the number keys to enter the Friendly Name and Frequency.
- 4 Press OK.

# play FM radio through speaker or headset

Icon rapidly flashes orange for incoming calls from an unknown caller, and slowly flashes orange for 30 minutes when there is a missed call from an unknown caller.

### 🖂 message icon

Icon flashes blue for 30 minutes when there is a new text or voice message.

### 👝 battery icon

Icon flashes orange when the battery power is low, and is continually lit when the battery is charging.

# notepad

# caller ID



*Calling line identification* (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call on your external and internal displays.

Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your contacts, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information isn't available.

### emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

**Note:** Emergency numbers vary by country. The preprogrammed emergency number(s) in your phone may not work in all locations. Sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

To call the emergency number at any time:

- 1 Press the keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- 2 Press 🕑 to call the emergency number.

# international calls

If your phone service includes international dialing, press and hold ① to insert your local international access code (indicated by +). Then, press the keypad keys to dial the country code, such as +④④ for the U.K., +③③ for France, etc., and phone number.

### 1-touch dial

To call contacts entries 1 through 9, press and hold the 1-Touch Dial number for one second.

You can set 1-Touch Dial to call the entries in your phone's memory contacts, your SIM card's contacts, or your **Fixed Dial** list:

### receive voicemail

When you receive a voicemail message, your phone displays **1 New Message** and a new voicemail indicator on the status pane. (Some networks only indicate when you have messages, whether they are new or not.) If users delete all voicemail messages, the voicemail indicator will disappear.

To listen to your voicemail messages:

Find it:  $Press \square > Messages > Voicemail$ 

Your phone may prompt you to store your voicemail phone number. If you do not have a voicemail number stored, the phone guides you through storing a number.
