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Section 1: Getting Started

Understanding this User Manual

The chapters of this manual generally follow the same order as the menus and sub-menus in your Samsung RogueTM. A robust index for quick reference to most features begins on page 194.

Also included is important safety information that you should know before using your Rogue[™]. Most of this information is near the back of the guide, beginning on page 170.

Notes and Tips

Throughout this guide are icons and text that are set apart from the rest. These are intended to point out important information, quick methods for activating features, to define terms, and more. The definitions for these methods are as follows:

- Notes: Explain alternative options within the current feature, menu, or sub-menu
- Tips: Provide quick or innovative methods for performing functions related to the subject at hand.
- Important!: Points out important information about the current feature that could affect performance, or even damage your phone.

This section allows you to start using your Rogue™ after activating your service, setting up your voicemail, contacting customer support, or getting an understanding of how this manual is put together.

Using the Battery

Note: This phone comes packaged with a partially charged rechargeable standard Li-Ion battery and wall charger.

You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A fully discharged battery requires up to 4 hours of charge time.

Important!: Although the phone can be used while the battery is charging, the battery must be fully charged before first use, otherwise you could damage the battery.

Battery Indicator

Using A Non-Supported Battery

Samsung handsets do not accept the use of a non-supported battery.

When using a non-supported battery, you will hear a series of beeps and you will see a warning message that indicates:

"NON-SUPPORTED BATTERY. SEE USER GUIDE"

If you receive this warning, battery charging has been disabled.

Samsung charging accessories (i.e. travel adapter, and cigarette lighter adapter) will only charge a Samsung-approved battery.

Note: When using a non-supported battery the handset can only be used for the duration of the life of the battery and cannot be recharged.

Important!: Using a non-supported battery may cause damage to your RogueTM. Use a Samsung supported battery only.

Installing the Battery

 Press down at the top of the battery cover, and slide the battery cover back and lift up to remove.



Insert the top end of the battery into the phone housing
using the directional arrow printed on the battery. The gold
contacts at the battery end must align with contacts on the
phone. Push bottom end of the battery down until it snaps
into place.





3. Insert the top of the battery cover down into the corresponding slots (positioned on each side of the cover). Push down on the bottom of the battery cover and push it up until it snaps into place.



Removing the Battery

1. Push the top of the battery cover forward. Lift the bottom of the battery cover to remove it.



2. Lift the battery from the bottom end and remove.





 Insert the top of the battery cover down into the corresponding slots (positioned on each side of the cover).
 Push down on the bottom of the battery cover and push it up until it snaps into place.



Inserting and Removing Your Memory Card (purchased separately)

Installing the Memory Card

1. Pull the microSD card cover out and turn to expose the card slot.



2. Push the microSD card into the slot until it locks into place.



Removing the Memory Card

- Pull the microSD card cover out and turn to expose the card slot.
- 2. Push in on the memory card to release the lock and remove memory card from the memory card slot.



Memory Card Formatting

Formatting a microSD™ Card using your Rogue™

- Insert the microSD™ memory card.
- From the Home screen, touch MENU → Settings & Tools.
- Scroll the screen up and touch 9. Memory → 3. Card Memory → 9. Format Card.
- At the Format card? pop-up, touch Yes to continue, or No to cancel the operation.

Formatting a microSD™ Card using your PC

For best playback of songs stored to the microSD™ memory card, you should reformat your memory card with PC format FAT32

Note: Any content currently stored on the microSD™ memory card will be lost when this procedure is performed.

- Insert the microSD™ memory card into an SD card adapter.
- Insert the SD card adapter into the SD card reader slot.
- 3. Plug the SD card reader into a USB port on your PC.

- On your PC, go to your My Computer directory and highlight the drive that represents the SD card reader.
- 5. Right click and select the Format option.
- Under the File System option, select FAT32 and click the Start button.
- Your microSD™ memory card will be reformatted.

Note: Your Rogue™ can support microSD™ memory cards with a capacity of 16GB maximum.

8. Remove the microSD™ card from the SD card reader and insert it back into your phone. The My Music directory will automatically be created on the microSD™ memory card the first time that you access V Cast Music I Rhapsody/My Music/Sync Music from your phone.

Charging the Battery

Your Rogue™ is powered by a rechargeable standard Li-ion battery. Only use Samsung-approved charging devices and batteries. Samsung accessories are designed to maximize battery life. Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.

Wall Charger

The wall charger is a convenient, light-weight charger that rapidly charges your Rogue™ from any 120/ 220 VAC outlet.

- Turn the connector cover to access the charger port.
- Insert the travel charger adapter end into the charging port on the left side of the Rogue[™].



3. Plug the wall/USB charger into a standard AC wall outlet.



When the RogueTM is completely charged (the battery icon becomes still), unplug the adapter from the power outlet.

Turning Your Phone On and Off

Press and hold the Power/End key to turn the phone's power on or off.

Setting Up Voicemail

Voicemail allows callers to leave voice messages, which can be retrieved any time.

Note: Once your voicemail account has been set up, you can use the voicemail selection 5 (under the Messaging menu) to view details of voice messages in your voicemail box.

Voicemail Setup*

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Dial Pa
- 3. When the recorded announcement begins, touch # to interrupt (if applicable).
- An easy-to-follow setup tutorial will begin. Follow the instructions to set up your new password and record a greeting.

Listening to Voicemail

- 1. Touch and hold 1 or touch * + 8 tuv 6 mno C Call
 - 2. Enter your password followed by # 🖥 key.
- Follow the recorded prompts to listen to messages, change administrative options, and so on.

^{*}Airtime and long distance charges apply. IN Calling minutes do not apply to voicemail setup or retrievals.

Section 2: Understanding Your Phone

This section outlines key features of your phone. It also displays the screen and the icons that are displayed when the phone is in use.

Closed View of Your Phone



Phone External Features

- Main LCD/Touch Screen: Displays all the information needed to operate your phone.
- Send key: Press to answer an incoming call or to dial a number. Press the key once to access the recent call log.
- 3. Clear key: Press to return to the previous menu or screen.
- 4. Earpiece: Allows you to hear the other caller.
- End/Power key: Powers the phone On or Off. Press to end a call or to return to the Home screen from any menu, submenu or options menu.
- Microphone: Allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.

Back View of Your Phone



Phone External Features

- **1. Speaker**: Music, ringtones and sounds are heard through the speaker.
- 2. Camera lens: Allows you to take photos.

Side View of Your Phone



Volume key: From the Home screen you can adjust the
master volume or adjust the voice volume during a call. To
mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume
key up or down. Also, press and hold the key to activate
Sound Off mode/Normal mode.

- Power Port: Used to plug in the charging adapter.
- Lock/Unlock key: Locks/unlocks display with a short press when power is On. Activates the backlight.
- 4. 3.5 mm Headset Jack: Allows you to plug in your standard music headphones (for listening to music only) or an optional headset for safe and convenient conversations.
- Voice Recognition key: Press to activate voice recognition features.
- Speakerphone/Zoom key: Press to activate speakerphone.
 Press and hold to increase and decrease size of web content.
- Camera/Camcorder key: Press to activate the camera, or press and hold to activate the camcorder.
- microSD™ Memory Card Slot: Allows you to insert a microSD™ memory card to add additional memory and storage capacity.

Open View of Your Phone

This touch screen phone also offers the convenience of a slideout QWERTY keyboard. To access the keyboard, rotate the phone 90 degrees to the left and slide the phone up.



When you slide the phone open, the display rotates from a portrait viewing mode to a landscape viewing mode.

QWERTY Keyboard Features

 QWERTY keyboard: Provides an alphanumeric character keyboard layout.

- 2. Fn key: The Fn (Function) key, toggles to access the orange symbols on the QWERTY keyboard. The Fn icon will appear on the top annunciator line of the display when function is On. (For more information regarding the annunciator line, see page 20.)
- 3. Shift key: Toggles the casing for alphabet characters between mixed case, uppercase and lowercase. Case will remain as selected until the Shift key is pressed again. Except for "Abc" mode, which only capitalizes the first character, then switches back to "abc". From the Home screen press to open the New Text Message screen.
- Space key: Allows you to add spaces between words and characters.
- Directional keys: Allows you to navigate through the phone menu options.
- OK key: Press when navigating through a menu to accept the highlighted choice, or perform an action in an application.

- Enter key: Press to perform the function highlighted in the menu or submenu. Press to enter spaces between lines of text.
- **8. Backspace key**: Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode.

Home Screen Layout



Understanding the Home Screen

- The Annunciator Line, which is the top line of your phone's display, shows icons that indicate network status, battery power, signal strength, connection type and more.
- The Widget Bar Tab displays the Widget Bar when touched.The Widget Bar allows you to quickly access menu items.
- 3. The Dialer button allows you to access the touch keypad for dialing numbers.
- The Contacts button allows you to access your Contact list.
- 5. The ERI banner indicates the service provider.
- 6. The Event Status Bar illuminates the icons to indicate recent events or status changes. Touch this bar to access the Event Manager screen. See "Event Status Bar and Event Manager" on page 22.
- The Menu button allows you to access the Main Menu screen.
- 8. The Message button allows you to open the Messaging menu.

Annunciator icons

Airplane Mode: Appears when Standalone Mode is on. When on, all RF functions for your phone are disabled, and you cannot use your phone to place or receive calls.

Roaming: Your phone is outside your home area. While roaming, another wireless provider may be handling your call. The service rate for the call may be higher than those made from within your home area. Please refer to Verizon Wireless for roaming rates.

FV signal strength: Appears when your phone is using the EVDO protocol. Appears when your phone is on and indicates the current signal strength. More bars indicate a stronger signal.

1X signal strength: Indicates your phone is using the CDMA
1X protocol. Appears when your phone is on and indicates
the current signal strength. More bars indicate a stronger
signal.

EV1X signal strength: The EVDO/1X protocol is capable of high-speed broadband data (3G). Appears when your phone is on and indicates the current signal strength. More bars indicate a stronger signal.

- D signal strength: Appears when your phone is receiving T DI digital data. Appears when your phone is on and indicates the current signal strength. More bars indicate a stronger signal.
 - **SSL**: Indicates the secure socket layer is actively transmitting your communications over the internet in an encrypted format.
 - Voice Privacy: Prevents eavesdropping over a CDMA traffic channel.
 - No Service: Your phone cannot find a signal because you're outside a service area. You cannot make or receive calls. Wait for a signal or move to an open area to find a signal. This indicator always appears when you first turn on your phone and disappears once service is located.
 - Voice Call: Indicates a call in progress.
- Data Call: Indicates a data call in progress. 刎
 - **Dormant**: Indicates no incoming or outgoing data.
- E911: Indicates Global Positioning Service (GPS) for 911 is \bigoplus set to On for emergency calls only.

 - **Location On:** Global Positioning Service is set to On for location and 911 calls.

- Battery Level: More bars indicate a greater charge. When the battery is low, an empty battery icon flashes and the phone sounds an alert, which indicates your phone is about to shut down.
- TTY: Indicates that TTY is enabled.

Bluetooth On: Indicates that Bluetooth wireless technology is turned on.

- **Bluetooth Connected:** Indicates Bluetooth wireless technology is turned on and is paired with another Bluetooth-enabled device.

Bluetooth Active: Indicates that Bluetooth wireless technology is connected to another device and receiving or pushing data.

Event Status Bar Icons



Vibrate On: Your phone vibrates upon receiving a call.



Speakerphone: Your phone switches to speakerphone instead of earpiece.



Missed Calls: Your phone displays this icon when calls are missed.



Message: Indicates that Bluetooth wireless technology is connected to another device and receiving or pushing data.



Calendar Appt: Your phone displays this icon when you have a calendar event scheduled.



Voicemail: You've received a voicemail message, page or web alert message. You have one or more unread voicemail messages in your voicemail box. (Only applicable on the Verizon Wireless Network.)



Alarm On: Indicates that your phone has an alarm set.



All Sounds Off: The ringer is silenced for all alerts, incoming calls, and incoming messages.



Alarm Only: Your phone will only ring when the set alarm sounds.

Event Status Bar and Event Manager

The Event Status Bar is an area that displays in the Home screen to inform you of calendar events, missed calls, or when new messages have been sent to the phone.

The Event Status bar appears on the bottom of the Home screen display.



If an icon is illuminated in color, it indicates a recent event for that function. Touching on the bar opens the Event Manager menu.

The following is a description of these onscreen notification icons:



Volume: The level of the ringer is set between Low and High in five incremental stages: Low, Medium Low, Medium, Medium High, and High.



Alarm Only: Your phone will only ring when the set alarm sounds.



Vibrate Only: Your phone vibrates upon receiving a call, a new message or voicemail, or when an alarm has been set.



All Sounds Off: All sounds have been disabled, including alarms.



New Messages: This icon is illuminated when you receive a new message.



Voicemail: This icon is illuminated when you receive a voicemail message or there is one or more unread voicemail messages in your voicemail box. (Only applicable on the Verizon Wireless Network.)



Missed Calls: This icon is illuminated when you have missed calls



Calendar Appt: This icon is illuminated when you have any events scheduled within the next 24 hours.




Speakerphone On: You can hear the other party in a call through the speaker.



Speakerphone Off: Youcan hear the other party through the earpiece.

Event Manager Menu

The Event Manager menu offers easy access to common functions. Touch the icons or text in the Event Manager menu to perform the action shown in the illustration below.



Backspace Button

The \times button erases or clears numbers, text, or symbols within the text fields. If you enter an incorrect character, touch \times to backspace (and delete) the character. To erase the previous word in a sentence, touch and hold \times.

End Button

The button and is used to end a call.

Answer Button

The Answer button and is used to activate or answer calls.

Call Button

Enter a number and touch Call to make a call.

Return Button

Touch to exit from the current menu and return to the previous screen.

Clear key

- Press to exit from the current menu and return to the previous screen.
- Press and hold or press to return to the Home screen.

Care and Use of the Touch Screen

Warning!: Your touch screen responds best to a light touch from the pad of your finger or a non-metallic stylus. Using excessive force or a metallic object when pressing on the touch screen may damage the tempered glass surface and void the warranty. See "Warranty Information" on page 190.

The precautions below should be followed when using the touch screen.

- Hands and fingers must be clean and dry. The touch screen is sensitive. Do not use excess force when using the touch screen.
 Sensitivity levels for the touch screen are adjustable. For more information, refer to "Touch Settings" on page 109.
- Do not sit or place heavy objects on the touch screen as damage may occur. Do not drag or scratch the touch screen with any sharp objects.
- Avoid extreme conditions (excess temperatures and humidity) when the phone is in use. Keep chemicals away from your phone that may damage or change the phone's appearance and functionality.
- Use a soft, clean, dry cloth to wipe the display and remove fingerprints.

Dialog Boxes

Dialog boxes prompt for action, inform you of status, or warn you of situations such as low memory. Dialog boxes and their definitions are outlined below.

• Choice -Example: "SAVE MESSAGE?"

• Confirm - Example: "ERASE ALL MESSAGES?"

• Performing -Example: "SENDING..." "CONNECTING..."

• Completed -Example: "MESSAGE SENT"

• Information -Example: "NEW MESSAGE"

• Error -Example: "SYSTEM ERROR!"

• Warning -Example: "BATTERY LOW," "MEMORY FULL!"

Section 3: Touch Screen Navigation

This section explains the navigation between functions for your Samsung Rogue™. It also includes an outline of all the available menus associated with your phone.

Note: Throughout the RogueTM User Manual, instructions apply to **Touch** Screen Navigation, except where noted.

Locking and Unlocking the Display

To lock the Rogue™,

▶ Press ⊕ (on the right side of the phone).

To unlock the Rogue™,

- When the Rogue[™] is locked, press any external key to illuminate the display.
- When the Rogue™ is locked, press (on the right side of the phone) to unlock.



Because this is a touch screen phone, keeping the phone in Lock mode may prevent the unintentional use of the Rogue™, and prevent unnecessary battery drainage. However, Auto Lock can be disabled under Touch Settings.

Navigating through Menus

As you navigate through a menu, options display on the screen as scrollable lists. The menu options buttons (located at the bottom of most screens, provide access to additional screen options).

To navigate a scrollable list:

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Head.
- 2. Touch an onscreen option.
- 3. From the available list of options you can either:
 - . Touch an onscreen entry to activate it.
 - Firmly press and slide your finger up or down the screen to scroll through lists of menu items.

Note: Tapping or touching individual entries on the list opens the list entry.



Note: When scrolling through a list (see below) make sure not to touch or press individual entries on the list as this will open the list entry.



Using the Accelerator Tab

Within the Contacts list (sorted alphabetically), the **Accelerator** Tab allows to quickly "thumb through" the alphabetical listing of entries by first letter ($A \rightarrow B \rightarrow C$, etc...). The **Accelerator** Tab is located along the left side of the screen.



Scrolling Through Field Entries

Some screens will ask you to assign a value to an onscreen field by either touching the up/down selection arrows or by quickly sliding through these values by using your fingertip. An example of these actions can be found on the Alarm page.

- Touch → Settings & Tools → Tools → Alarm Clock →
 Alarm 1 or Touch On.
- Touch the Time field and then adjust the hour and minutes values by using either the up/down input arrows or by quickly sliding your fingertip over the numbers.



Widgets

The Widget Bar provides quick access to programs, menus, and widgets. This bar (located at the left of the Home screen) gives you information at a glance and provides easy access to frequently used tools such as (Alarm, Birthday, Bluetooth, Calculator, Calendar, Clock, Date, Dice, Facebook, Games, My Favorites, My Pictures, My shortcuts, My Verizon, MySpace, Notepad, Personal Banner, Photobucket, Sketch Pad, Tutorial, Twitter, Widget Settings, and YouTube).



You can easily customize the Widget Bar by dragging the Widget on the Home Screen to undock the Widget. You can then drag

the Widget to your preferred position back to the Widget Bar to dock the Widget.

Adding and Deleting Widgets

To select which items are displayed or hidden within the Widget Bar:

From the Home screen, touch Menu → Menu → Settings & Tools → 5. Display Settings → 3. Widgets.



The following table contains a description of each available widget, its function, and how to navigate to that particular application. If the application is already described in another section of this user manual, a cross reference is then provided.



Alarm Clock: allows you to access alarm settings.

 For more information, refer to "Alarm Clock" on page 152.



Birthday: displays an onscreen alert for birthdays occurring during the month. It also indicates birthdays occurring one week prior to the current date and three weeks after the current date. These dates have been previously entered for an entry within the Contact List in the Birthday field.



Bluetooth: from this application you can activate Bluetooth and configure it so other Bluetooth devices can see your device by name.

 For more information, refer to "Bluetooth Menu" on page 99.



Calculator: allows you to use a built-in calculator.

• For more information, refer to "Calculator" on page 149.



Calendar: allows you to access the Calendar feature.

With the Calendar feature, you can:

- · View the calendar by month, week, or day.
- · Set schedules and note anniversaries.
- For more information, refer to "Calendar" on page 151.



Clock: displays the current day, date and time. Simply touch the Clock icon to customize the clock format.



Date: displays the current day and date.



Dice: allows access to the Dice game. Simply touch the Dice widget to begin playing.



Facebook: allows you to access the Facebook mobile website. Simply touch the Facebook widget to go directly to the site.



Games: allows access to gaming applications. Simply touch the Games widget to access games.



My Favorites: allows quick access to your 11 favorite contacts. Simply touch the desired contact to access.

 For more information, refer to "Favorites" on page 62.



My Pictures: allows you to view the list of preloaded and downloaded images or wallpapers, images received in messages and saved to your device, or a photo taken by the camera. You can then assign an image as the current wallpaper.

• For more information, refer to "Using the Camera" on page 135.



My Shortcuts: allows quick access to up to 11 of your favorite applications or menus.



My Verizon: allows quick access to My Verizon and your Verizon Wireless account information online. You can surf the web, setup Favorites or choose from available applications.



MySpace: allows you to access the MySpace mobile website. Simply touch the MySpace widget to go directly to the site.



Notepad: allows you to quickly capture thoughts, reminders, ideas and phone numbers. Simply touch the Notepad widget to access the Notepad.



Personal Banner: allows you to create your own personalized greeting that appears in the Home screen. Simply touch the Personal Banner widget to go to the Personal Banner screen.



Photobucket: allows you to access the Photobucket mobile website. Simply touch the Photobucket widget to go directly to the site.



Sketch Pad: allows you access the Sketch Pad application. Simply touch the Sketch Pad widget to create free hand sketches.



Help: provides access to information for various functions and features. Simply touch the Tutorial widget to access.



Twitter: allows you to access the Twitter mobile website. Simply touch the Twitter widget to go directly to the site.



Widget Settings: allows you to customize the Widget Bar. Simply touch the Widget Setting widget to go to the Widget menu.



YouTube: allows you to access the YouTube mobile website. Simply touch the YouTube widget to go directly to the site.

Widget Bar Navigation

Many widgets can be used directly from the Widget Bar without dragging them onto the Home screen or simply drag the widgets to the desktop to use the application or feature, then drag it back to the Widget Bar when you are finished.

Accessing the Widget Bar

- Tap the Widget Bar tab, located on the left side of the main display, to open the Widget Bar.
- Tap the Widget Bar tab again to close the Widget Bar.

Undocking Widgets

You can easily customize the Widget Bar by either keeping them docked within the bar itself or undocking them by dragging them anywhere on your Home screen.

- 1. Touch and hold the widget (1).
- While still holding the icon, in a single motion, drag it over to the new location and release your finger from the screen (2). The widget is now located on the Home screen.





Rearranging Widgets

You can also customize the Widget Bar by arranging the location of your current widgets. This can help you place your frequently used (favorite) widgets at the top of the list.

- 1. Touch and hold the widget (1).
- While still holding the icon, in a single motion, drag it away from the Widget Bar (2) then drag it back into its new location in the list.





Activating a Widget

- Locate your widget (whether it is still docked in the Widget Bar or on the Home screen).
- Touch the widget to activate.

Scrolling Through the Widget Bar

Although the Widget Bar contains a number of widgets, only six widgets are visible at a time.

▶ Use your fingertip to scroll up and down along the Widget Bar.

Tip: Flick the screen up or down motion to quickly scroll through the list.

Keyboard Navigation

Access menus using the slide-out QWERTY keyboard.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch MENU. The first of several menus appear in the display.
- Touch the various icons to browse phone menus.
- 3. Touch the menu item text to enter the main menu or submenu appearing in the display or press the corresponding number (1-9) or special character (press fn to enter -*, #) keys to access the sub-menu. You can press the directional keys to scroll in a menu or long text screen.

Section 4: Call Functions

This section describes how to make, answer or end a call.

Making a Call

- From the Home screen, touch Daller . The touch keypad displays.
- Touch the numbers to call using the touch keypad and touch Call. Remember to include necessary long distance codes.
 - or -
- Open slide of phone.
- From the Home screen, touch and enter the phone, or Vanity number using the QWERTY keypad.

Note: Phone numbers may be entered in either numeric or alphabetic mode using the QWERTY keyboard, but will be converted to numeric when dialed or saved.

3. Touch Call

Note: If the number(s) entered is a speed dial location, the phone number associated with that location will be dialed.

Ending a Call

Follow the steps below to end a call.

1. If the backlight is off, press the Clear key to illuminate the display and unlock your device.

Note: If the backlight is on but the display is locked, press the factorial Lock/Unlock key to unlock the display, or touch the Lock icon

Press the End/Power key or touch the button to disconnect the call.

Three-way Calling

You can combine two, two-party calls into one three-way call. Follow the steps below for making three-way calls.

Making a Three-way Call

- Follow the steps for "Making a Call" on page 38 or "Answering a Call on page 40.
- While your call is in-progress with the first participant, dial the second phone number.

Note: If the dial pad is turned off, touch before dialing the second number.

- Touch C Call. When the second participant answers, the second call is connected.
- Touch Merge Calls . The call becomes active with three participants.

Making Calls Using Contacts

A contact is an entry that you have created to store names, numbers, and other information for people or groups of interest. For more information, refer to "Adding a Contact" on page 52.

1. From the Home screen, touch



Contacts.

Note: Press the phone button to the right of the Contact name on the CONTACT LIST screen, a call will be placed to that number.

Touch the name of the contact. Touch the desired phone number (mobile, home, work, etc.) to dial.

Note: If the desired phone number is not visible, use the scrolling method to view additional phone numbers.

Answering a Call

When you receive an incoming call:

- Touch Answer or press to answer the call.
- Touch Ignore to send the call to voicemail.
- Touch Quiet or press the Volume key to silence the ringer.
- Touch Ignore +TXT to ignore the call and send a TXT message to the caller.

Answering Call-Waiting Calls

When you receive a call while on a call:

- Touch Answer to answer the incoming call, while the original caller is placed on hold.
- Touch Switch Call to return to your original call.

Call In-Progress Options

Access numerous menus and features even while in a call. The following icons appear in the in-call screen:

Note: If the call is disconnected while accessing the Call-In Progress Options, the options disappear from the display and the Rogue™ eventually returns to the Home screen.



Touch **Speaker On** to turn on the speakerphone function during a call. Touch **Speaker Off** to turn the speaker phone function off.



Touch **Mute** to mute the call. Touch **Unmute** to unmute the call.



Touch **Bluetooth** to open the Bluetooth menu. Touch to return to the in-call screen.

 For more information, refer to "Bluetooth Menu" on page 99.



Touch **Notepad** to open the notepad menu. Touch to return to the in-call screen.

 For more information, refer to "Notepad" on page 155.



Touch **Whisper Mode** when speaking softly or when the caller cannot hear your voice clearly. This mode is useful in meetings or public places.



Touch End Call to disconnect a call.

Dialer

Touch **Dialer** to display the Dialpad. Press **[]** to return to the in-call screen.



Contacts

Touch Contacts to view you Contact List. To call a contact while in a call simply touch the contacts number.

• For more information, refer to "Understanding Your Contacts" on page 51.

Touch **Options** while in a call to perform additional functions. The following options appear in the display:

- New TXT Message: Allows you to create a new text message.
- · Recent Calls: Displays your recent incoming, missed and outgoing calls.
- Bluetooth Menu: Displays the Bluetooth menu.
- Main Menu: Displays the Main menu.
- Voice Privacy: Prevents eavesdropping over a CDMA traffic channel.

Recent Calls

Dialed, missed, and received calls are saved in Recent Calls. including a set of timers for these calls. These categories are listed below.

- . Missed: Displays any missed calls.
- Received: Displays any received calls that were answered.
- Dialed: Displays all outgoing calls made from your Roque™.
- All: Displays all missed, received, and outgoing calls made from your Roque™.
- View Timers: Displays amount of time for: Last Call. All Calls. Received Calls, Dialed Calls, Roaming Calls, Transmit Data, Received Data, Total Data, Last Reset, Lifetime Calls, and Lifetime Data Counter.

Call History Icons

When you view All Recent Calls, an icon to the left of the number indicates the type of call.



Indicates a received call that was answered.



Indicates a dialed call.



Indicates a received call that was missed.

Viewing Recent Call History

Recent Calls retains information such as the duration, date and time, and whether the call was missed, received or dialed. It also retains information about the timers that accrue data of these calls.

- From the Home screen, press _____.
- Touch the Recent Calls drop down arrow.
- Touch a call location (i.e. All Calls, Missed Calls, Received Calls, or Dialed Calls).



- I. The following call information displays:
 - Call History Drop Down: Touch the drop down arrow to the right to view the call logs from the various options screens. Choose from: All Calls, Missed Calls, Received Calls, or Dialed Calls.
 - Call Type: The title bar displays if the call is a missed, dialed, or received.
 - Name: If the caller is in your Contacts list, their name is listed here
 as well as the appropriate icon to indicate Mobile 1, Mobile 2,
 Home, Work, or Fax. This option only appears if the caller is in your
 Contacts list. If the caller is not in your Contacts list, No Name
 appears.
 - Number: Displays the telephone number.
 - Date: The date of the call.
 - View Timer: Displays the duration of All Calls, Received Calls, Dialed Calls and Roaming Calls.


Making Calls Using Call History

Touch next to the desired phone number (or entry name if already in your Contact List).

Deleting Call History Entries

Roaming

What is Roaming?

Your Roque™ can roam on other compatible digital networks. Roaming occurs when you travel outside a pre-designated coverage area. The roaming icon \triangle displays when roaming is active. Extra charges may apply when making or receiving calls.

Note: Some features may be unavailable while roaming.

Roaming Options

The following roaming options are available:

- Home Only Your Roque™ is available for normal operation only in the designated coverage area.
- Automatic: The preferred roaming list is used to acquire service.

Note: Contact Verizon Wireless for information regarding preferred systems.

To change your Roaming option, follow these steps:

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → Settings & Tools → 7. Phone Settings.
- 2. Scroll the screen up and touch 8. System Select. To make your selection, touch Home Only or Automatic roaming options.

TTY

Your Roque™ is fully TTY compatible. Connect the TTY equipment to the headset jack, which is located on the top of your Roque™. Before you can use your Roque™ with a TTY device, vou'll need to enable TTY functions in the Roque™.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch MENU → Settings & Tools.



- Scroll the screen up and touch 8. Call Settings.
- Touch the **TTY Mode** drop down menu.
- A warning appears in the display stating "Enabling TTY will disable headset audio. Continue?"

Touch Yes to proceed to TTY MODE screen. Touch No to return to Call Settings menu.

- Touch to select one of the following options:
 - TTY Full
 - TTY + Talk (VCO)
 - TTY + Hear (HCO)
 - TTY Off
- You are returned to the **Call Settings** menu.

Voice Commands

Voice Commands is advanced speech recognition software that can be used to activate a wide variety of functions on your Rogue™. Voice Commands software automatically voice activates all contacts for voice dialing and searching, no prerecording or training needed. Speak phone numbers naturally to dial, and use voice commands to navigate phone menus.



From the Home screen, press
the 🕞 Voice Commands button (on the right side of the phone).

The following is a list of functions you can perform using Voice Commands speech recognition on your phone.

- Call <Name or #>: Dial by saying a Name in your Contacts List, a Name and a Location (home, work, mobile) or the phone number.
- Send <MSG Type>: Send a text, picture, or video message to a number or to someone in your Contacts List.
- Go To <Menu>: Open any application installed on your device.

- Check < Item>: Provides details of your phone status, Voicemail, Messages, Missed Calls, Time, Signal Strength, Battery Level, Volume Level, Balance, Minutes, Payment, and My Number.
- Contacts <Name>: Open the contact record for a matched name in your Contacts List.
- Redial: Allows you to call the last number dialed.
- Play <Playlist>: Opens the My Music menu, or plays songs in a playlist or all songs if requested.
- My Verizon: Provides information about your Verizon Wireless account
- Help: Provides a helpful tutorial on how to use Voice Commands.

Call <Name or #>

Digit Dial allows you to dial any phone number by simply speaking the digits into the Rogue $^{\text{TM}}$. No training is necessary, and Digit Dial is programmed to understand natural speech.

Note: You may need to train the speech recognition to understand Contact names that you speak.

From the Home screen, press the Voice Commands button (on the right side of the phone).

- 2. After a brief pause, a list of optional commands appears in the display and the audio prompt "Please say a command" plays through the speakerphone. Say "Call" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the phone in a natural voice.
- "Please say the name, number, voicemail or last number" plays through the speaker.
- To use Digit Dialing, say the area code and number you want to dial into the microphone, clearly and naturally.

- or -

To use Name Dialing, say the name of one of your Contacts you want to dial.

Note: The entry for Name Dialing must be stored in your Contact list.

- The number or name you said is repeated through the speaker and your phone dials the number.
- If Voice Commands is not sure of the number you said, a list of possible matches appears in the display.
- You're asked to confirm the correct number as Voice Commands displays the results.
 - Say "Yes" to confirm the number.

- Say "No" to reject the number.
- Say "Exit" to exit the Voice Command.
- Say "Repeat" to have the selected number read one more time.

Note: In case various numbers are displayed, "Which Number?" will display in the Listening menu option.

The location is repeated through the speaker and your phone dials the number.

Send < Msg Type>

Send Text, Picture or Video

Use the following steps to send a text, picture or video message with Voice Commands.

- From the Home screen, press the Voice Commands button (on the right side of the phone).
- A list of commands appears in the display and the audio prompt "Please say a command" plays through the speakerphone, if it is enabled.
- Say "Send Text" or "Send Picture" or "Send Video" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone.
 - "Please say the name, number, or group" plays through the speakerphone.

4. Say the name exactly as it is displayed in your Contacts list, or say the phone number of the recipient.

Note: In case various numbers are displayed, "Which Number?" will display in the Listening menu option.

5. The contact name or number appears in the To: field. For more information on how to complete the text, picture or video message, see "Creating and Sending Text Messages" on page 74, "Creating and Sending Picture Messages" on page 76 or "Creating and Sending Video Messages" on page 78.

Goto < Menu>

The "Go To" command allows you to access a menu within the Rogue™ (for example, "Go to Contacts"). If no menu option is stated, a list of options will be provided.

Opening Menus and Applications

To begin navigation of menu items on your Rogue $^{\text{TM}}$ or to open select applications using Voice Commands, perform the following:

From the Home screen, press the Voice
 Commands button (on the right side of the phone).

- A list of commands appears in the display and the audio prompt "Please say a command" plays through the speakerphone.
- 3. To begin navigation of menu items, say "Go To" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone. The menu list displays and a prompt of "Which shortcut?" plays through the speakerphone.
- Say the application name or menu item you would like to open.

Check < Item>

Checking Phone Status

- From the Home screen, press the Voice Commands button (on the right side of the phone).
- A list of commands appears in the display and the audio prompt "Please say a command" plays through the speakerphone.
- 3. Say "Check" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone. "Which status item?" plays through the speakerphone. Valid "Check" commands are:

- Status: Displays and announces all of the available status indicators in sequence.
- Voicemail: Displays the number of new voicemail messages.
- Messages: Displays and announces the number of new voicemail, TXT, and Picture messages.
- Missed Calls: Displays the missed call log.
- Time: Displays and announces the current time.
- Signal Strength: Displays and announces the current EVDO and 1x signal strength levels.
- Battery Level: Displays and announces the current battery level.
- Volume: Displays and announces the current master volume setting.
- Balance: Calls #BAL.
- Minutes: Displays and sends a free text message to your phone with the minute information.
- Payment: Calls #PMT for payment information.
- My Number: Displays and announces your telephone number.
- The option spoken opens.

Contacts < Name>

To perform a name lookup, you'll need to have some entries in your Contacts list.

From the Home screen, press the Voice
 Commands button (on the right side of the phone).

- A list of commands appears in the display and the audio prompt "Please say a command" plays through the speakerphone.
- Say "Lookup" or "Contacts" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone. "Please say the name" plays through the speakerphone.
- Say the name exactly as it is displayed in your Contacts list. The contact name appears in the display with other information that you've entered for that contact.

Redial

- From the Home screen, press the (3) Voice
 Commands button (on the right side of the phone.)
- A list of commands appears in the display and the audio prompt "Please say a command" plays through the earpiece or speakerphone.
- In a single command, after the beep, say "Redial".
- 4. The last number dialed is redialed.

Play <Playlist>

Play

Play launches the **My Music** menu screen. Options are listed in the following order:

Genres, Albums, Playlist, Play All, Artists, Songs, Inbox and Shuffle.

- From the Home screen, press the Voic Commands button (on the right side of the phone).
- A list of commands appears in the display and the audio prompt "Please say a command" plays through the speakerphone.
 - If you say "Play", the My Music menu launches.
 - If you say "Play" followed by a playlist name, songs on the playlist will begin to play.
 - If you say "Play All", all songs will play in alphabetical song title order.

My Verizon

Using Voice Commands, you can check your Verizon Wireless account status by Voice Command.

Note: This features launches the browser to your account page, and requires a data plan and is subject to Verizon Wireless data coverage.

- From the Home screen, press the (3) Voice
 Commands button (on the right side of the phone). A list of
 commands appears in the display and the audio prompt
 "Please say a command" plays through the speakerphone.
- Say, "My Verizon" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the phone in a natural voice.
- The phone's web browser will launch and display your account information. For details on using your browser, see "Browser" on page 159

Help

Provides helpful information on how to use Voice Commands.

- From the Home screen, press the (3) Voice

Adding a Contact

When you add information to your Contacts, you can add it as a new entry or as an existing entry.

Method 1

Creating a new Contact from the Home screen

1. From the Home screen, touch





- Touch the **Image** icon and assign a picture to the new entry by choosing one of the following:
 - My Pictures: Allows you to insert a picture that has been saved to My Pictures.
 - Take Picture: Allows you to capture a photo to insert as the contacts picture.
- 3. Touch the Name input field. Enter a name for the entry using the touch keypad or the QWERTY keyboard. After entering the name, touch
- Touch the appropriate field (Mobile 1. Home, Work, Email 1. etc.) to input a number. Once highlighted, use the touch keypad or QWERTY keyboard to enter required information.
- When you're finished entering information for the entry, to save the entry to your Contacts.

Method 2

Adding a number to a new or existing Contact from the Home screen

You can add new numbers to the Contacts by simply entering the number into the Dial Pad, then following the necessary prompts to complete the process.

- Enter the phone number using the touch keypad or QWERTY keyboard, then touch Save . You're prompted to select from Add New Contact, Update Existing, or Notepad.
- Touch 1. Add New Contact to enter the number as a new contact, touch 2. Update Existing to update an existing contact, or touch 3. Notepad to save the entry to a new note.

- If you selected Update Existing, proceed to Step 9. If you selected Notepad, proceed to step 13.

- Touch the desired entry type (Mobile 1, Mobile 2, Home, Work, etc.).
- 7. Touch the Name field to enter a name for the entry using the touch keypad. Touch Abc if you wish to select a different method of text entry, such as T9 Word, Abc, ABC, 123, or Symbols. Touch Done to exit the Name field.
- When you're finished entering information for the entry, touch Save.
 The entry is saved to your Contacts.
- 9. If you selected **Update Existing**, the Contact List opens.
 - Touch and then slide the Accelerator Tab to the letter range corresponding to the first letter of the entry's first name. (The list is alphabetized by the first letter.) or

- Using the QWERTY keyboard, enter enough letters to identify the entry. Once you've located the entry to update, touch the entry to access the Update Existing display.
- 10. Touch the contacts name.
- Touch the desired contact number type to store the number.
- **12.** Touch Save to save the updated entry.
- 13. If you selected Notepad, the Notepad opens with the phone number entered into the Add New Note screen. Type in any additional text and touch Save to save it.
- 14. Go back to Step 2 if you also want to add this number to a new or existing contact, or press the C Clear key to return to the Home screen

Method 3

Creating or Updating Contacts Using Call History

- From the Home screen, press
- Scroll through the list of calls and touch the number to add to your Contact List or to update your Contact List.
- 3. Touch save . The Save menu displays with two options:

- Add New Contact
- Update Existing

For **Add New Contact**, the following types are available:

- Mobile1Mobile2
- Home
- Work
- Fax
 - 4. (If you selected **Update Existing**, proceed to step 9.)
- Touch the desired entry type (Mobile 1, Mobile 2, Home, Work, or Fax).
- 6. To enter a name for the entry, touch the Name field using the touch keypad or QWERTY keyboard. Touch Abc if you wish to select a different method of text entry, such as

- T9 Word, Abc, ABC, 123, or Symbols. When you have completed entering the name, touch the appropriate number field (Mobile1, Mobile2, Home, Work, or Fax).
- To assign the contact to a Group, touch the **Group** field and touch the desired category (Business, Colleague, Family, Friends) and touch

Note: No more than 10 contacts may be added to any group.

- When you're finished entering information for the entry. touch Save . The entry is saved to your Contacts List.
- If you selected **Update Existing** from the Recent Calls list, a list of existing contacts displays. Select the contact to update from the list.
- 10. On the Update Existing screen, touch the field to update. The Edit Contact screen displays. The information from the recent call is entered in the selected field. While you are on this screen, you may also update other fields. When finished, touch Save

Adding Pauses

Calls to automated systems often require a password or account number. Instead of manually entering numbers each time, store the numbers to your Contacts along with special characters called pauses.

- 1. From the Home screen, touch Dialer.

- Enter the phone number up to where you want to add the Wait using the touch keypad, then touch Options
- Touch **1. Add 2-Sec Pause** (a "p" appears in the display) or 2. Add Wait (a "w" appears in the display).
 - Add Wait: A hard pause stops the calling sequence until further input from you.
 - Add 2-Sec Pause: A two-second pause stops the calling sequence for two seconds and then automatically sends the remaining digits.
- After your entry, touch Save
- Continue with Method 2, Step 4 for Adding a number to a new or existing Contact from the Home screen.

Note: Entering multiple Add Pauses extends the length of a pause. For example, two consecutive Add Pauses cause a total pause time of four seconds. Keep in mind pauses count as digits towards the 48-digit maximum.

Contact List

Finding a Contact Entry

From the Home screen, you can quickly open the Contacts list.

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- Press and then slide the Accelerator Tab to the letter range corresponding to the first letter of the entry's first name. (The list is alphabetized by the first letter.)

Editing an Existing Contact Entry

- From the Home screen, touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch the desired contact list entry and touch
- Touch the name, number, Email address, or other field that you wish to edit.
- Touch to backspace and delete numbers, text, or symbols, or touch and hold to erase everything in the highlighted field.
- Use the touch keypad or QWERTY keyboard to re-enter numbers, text, or symbols.
- **6.** When you're finished editing the entry, touch **Done**
- 7. Touch Save to save your changes.
- 8. Press (to return to the contact list.

Deleting a Contact Entry

From the Home screen, touch Contacts.

Touch the desired contact list entry.

3. Touch Erase

A confirmation message appears. Touch Yes to delete the entry from the Contact List. Touch No to stop the process.

Backup Assistant

Backup Assistant is a wireless service that saves a copy of your phone's address book to a secure web site. If your phone is lost, stolen or damaged, Backup Assistant can restore your saved address book to a new phone - wirelessly! Schedule daily backups save your information manually or automatically! Login to your web account and get full access to your address book. You can view, print, add, delete and edit contacts. Changes are sent to your phone with one click!

Visit http://www.verizonwireless.com/backupassistant. Standard TXT messaging rates apply. Backup Assistant is free for My Verizon subscribers.

Contact Groups

You can place Contact entries into categories, called "**Groups**." Groups allow you to search your Contacts faster, quickly send messages to one or more group members, and more.

Note: By default, new entries to your Contacts are placed into the No Group category unless a specific group category is selected.

View Groups

From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 4. Groups. The following groups appear in the display:

- Rusiness
- · Colleague
- Family
- Friends
- 2. Touch the desired group.

Add a New Member to a Group

Once you have selected the desired group, you can add Contacts from your Contact List to that group, using the following procedure:

From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 4. Groups and touch a group name.

The current members of that group display. If there are no members, a banner displays: **NO GROUP MEMBERS**.

2. Touch Add Members , and the list of Contacts displays.

3. Touch the entry or entries to add to the group, then touch Done . The list of members of the Group display.

Note: A maximum of ten members can be assigned to a group.

Remove an Entry from a Group

- From the **Groups** menu, touch the group name.
 The current members of that group display.
- 2. Touch Remove Members
- To select a member to erase, touch the entry. A checkmark is added to the member.
- 4. When the member(s) to remove are selected, touch
 Done . A confirmation message appears. Touch Yes to remove the entry; touch No to stop the process.

Move an Entry to Another Group

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 2. Contact List. The Contact List displays.
- Touch an entry in the Contact List and the information for that Contact displays. This includes the Group that the contact is assigned to.
- 3. Touch Edit . The Edit Contact screen displays.
- Scroll to locate the Group field and touch the entry field.
- 5. The following groups display:

Note: Touch Mark All to add the member to each group.

- Business
- Colleague
- Family
- Friends
- Touch the desired group. A checkmark is added to the group.
- 7. Touch Done . The contact information has been saved with the new Group information.

Create a New Group

In addition to the four groups already in your Samsung Rogue™, you can create additional groups (a maximum of 25). New group names must be within a 32-character limit.

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 4. Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.
- 2. Touch New Group . The Enter New Group screen displays.
- Using the touchpad or the QWERTY keyboard, enter the name of the new group.
- Touch Done . The Groups list now displays the new group added.

Send a Text Message to Members of a Group

Use this feature to send a message to as many as 10 members of a group at once.

Note: Text messaging availability varies when roaming off the Verizon Wireless Network.

From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 4. Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.

- Touch beside the desired group name → New TXT
 Message.
- Touch a contact name to select it, or touch Mark All to select all contact names in the list. A check mark will appear beside the contact's number.
- 4. Touch Done . The Send TXT Message header displays.

Note: You can mark up to 10 members of a group for message distribution.

- Enter the content of your message using the touch keypad or the QWERTY keyboard and touch Done.

Note: Only available within Verizon Wireless Enhanced Services Area.

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → Touch 4. Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.

- Touch a contact name to select it, or touch Mark All to select all contact names in the list. A check mark will appear beside the contact's number.
- 4. Touch Done . The Send New Message header displays.

Note: You can mark up to 10 members of a group for message distribution.

 - Text: Add text to the Picture Message.
 - Picture: Add an image from the My Pictures gallery to the message.
 - Sound: Add sound to the Picture Message.
 - Subject: Add a subject to the Picture Message.

- Once you've finished adding the desired content to your Picture Message, touch Send.

Send a Video Message to Members of a Group

Note: Only available within Verizon Wireless Enhanced Services Area.

Send a Voice Message to Members of a Group

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → **Contacts** → **4. Groups**. Your existing groups appear in the display.
- beside the desired group name → New Voice Touch Message.
- Touch a contact name to select it, or touch Mark All to select all contact names in the list. A check mark will appear beside the contact's number.
- Record and save your message. The saved recording will be automatically inserted into the message.
- The **New Voice Message** header displays.

Note: You can mark up to 10 members of a group for message distribution.

- Touch the following entry fields:
 - Text: Add text to the Video Message.
 - Subject: Add a subject to the Video Message.

- Name Card: Attach a Name Card or an entry in your Contacts to the message.
- 7. Once you've finished adding the desired content to your Voice Message, touch

Speed Dialing

Speed dialing allows you to touch and hold a key (or keys) to dial the number associated with those kev(s). There are two types of speed dialing; 1-touch, and 2-touch dialing.

Note: 1-Touch and 2-Touch, dialing allows you to call numbers stored in your Contact List quicker. Memory location 001 is reserved for voicemail.

1-touch dialing

Call phone numbers assigned to memory locations 002 - 009 by touching and holding the any of the 2 - 9 keys. For example, to speed dial the number assigned to location 2, touch access the touch keypad, then you must touch and hold



until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

2-touch dialing

Call phone numbers assigned to keys 010 through 099 by touching Dialer to access the touch keypad, and briefly touching the first key, then touching and holding the second key. For example, to speed dial the number assigned to 013, briefly touch 12, then touch and hold 3 def until the number dials.

Assign a speed dial location

- From the Home screen, touch → MENU → Contacts → 5. Speed Dials. The Speed Dials screen displays with the first available number at the top of the list.
- Touch the number you wish to assign to the speed dial location by entering the location number using the touch keypad.

The SET SPEED DIAL screen displays.

Touch the entry you want to assign to that speed dial location.

- A confirmation message appears. Touch Yes to assign the entry to the Speed Dial list. Touch No to stop the process.
- Continue to assign speed dial entries or press and hold the Clear key on the front of the phone to return to the Home screen.

Favorites

Favorites allows you to save your most frequently accessed contacts for quick access.

- From the Home screen, touch the My Favorites widget.
- 2. Touch +
- At the Add favorite from pop-up, touch Contacts to add members from your contacts list, or Groups to add members from your groups.
- Touch the contact(s) or group member you would like to add and touch Done

Removing a Favorite

- From the Home screen, touch the widget.

 My Favorites
- Touch (in the lower right corner).
- Touch Remove All to place a checkmark alongside all Favorites entries or touch the Favorites entry you would like to delete and touch pone.
- At the Remove favorite? pop-up, touch Yes to continue, or No to cancel the operation.

Emergency Contacts

Assigning an Emergency Contact - From Contacts

From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 7. In Case of Emergency. The Emergency
 Contacts screen displays Contacts 1, Contacts 2, Contacts 3
 and Personal Info.

Note: Use the **Personal Information** option to enter information such as illnesses, allergies, and other detail information.

 Touch either Contacts 1, Contacts 2 or Contacts 3. The From Contacts and New Contact entries are displayed. 3. Touch From Contacts to add an emergency number from your contacts list. Touch a Contact to assign the contact.

Assigning an Emergency Contact with a New Contact

- Repeat steps 1 through 3 in the previous section. See "Assigning an Emergency Contact - From Contacts" on page 63.
- Touch NewContact to enter a new contact as an emergency number. Enter Contact information then touch Save... The Emergency Contact is added and is displayed in the Contact List in red font.

Unassigning an Emergency Contact

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 7. In Case of Emergency.
- Touch the Emergency Contact to unassign.

Note: Emergency contacts are displayed in red font.

- 3. Touch Unassign and touch Yes
- The Emergency Contact screen displays with the contact removed.

My Name Card

My Name Card allows you to create a virtual business card. Once completed, you can send the card to recipients as a vCard attachment.

- Open your device in landscape mode, from the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 8. My Name Card.
- Touch each field, and enter information in the field as desired. Use the touch keypad or the QWERTY keyboard to enter information.

Note: A check mark appears to the left of selected contacts.

When finished, touch Save to save the Name Card.

Sending Contact Information (vCard) to another Bluetooth - enabled phone

You can send individual contacts or your entire contact list to or from another device that is Bluetooth enabled*.

Note: *If Bluetooth is not powered on, or your Rogue™ is not paired with another device, see "Turning Bluetooth On or Off" on page 101.

Important!: Not all Bluetooth devices will accept a name card.



- Touch a contact name to select it, or touch Mark All to select all contact names in the list. A check mark will appear beside the contact's number. Touch Done
- Touch the destination device.

Note: If your Rogue™ is not paired already with the destination device, follow the instructions on p.90 for Bluetooth Search.

- The "CONNECT TO < DEVICE NAME>?" prompt displays.
 Touch Yes.
- Confirm the name card transfer by selecting the appropriate key on the other device if prompted.
- When the information is exchanged, a message will appear that the transfer is complete.

Note: ** All information will be transferred except for group name, ringtone, and Emergency contact reference.

Sending a Name Card (vCard) from Groups

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → Contacts → 4. Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.
- Touch the desired group name → Options → Send Name
 Card → Touch a message type.
- Touch a contact name to select it, or touch Mark All to select all contact names in the list. A check mark will appear beside the contact's number. Touch Done

Note: If creating a Voice Message, you must first record and save your message. The saved recording will be automatically inserted into the message.

- Populate appropriate fields.
- Once you've finished adding the desired content to your message, touch Send.

Finding My Phone Number

My Number displays the ten-digit number assigned to your RogueTM.

 From the Home screen, touch MENU → Settings & Tools.

- 2. Scroll the screen up and touch *. Phone Info.
- Touch 1. My Number. The mobile device, phone number, and mobile identification number are displayed.

Section 6: Selecting Text Entry Modes

This section outlines how to select the desired text input mode when entering characters into your Samsung $Rogue^{TM}$.

Entering Text Using the QWERTY Keyboard

Your device provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when entering information into a field, surfing the Web, and Text Messaging).

To access the QWERTY keyboard

 Firmly grasp the front and back of your Rogue[™] with both hands.

In a single motion, use your thumbs to slide the top section of the device up to open, as shown in the following illustration.



The built-in slider QWERTY keyboard supports quick and easy text input, just as you would when using a computer's keyboard. When you display a screen where you can enter text, use the keyboard to enter different character types:



Function: Allows you to use characters displayed at the top of the QWERTY keys. Examples: $<,>,^*,\$,@,$ #, ?

- Press Fo once to toggle from letters to orange special characters on the QWERTY keyboard.
 When Function is ON, the Fn icon will appear on the top annunciator line of the display.
- Press twice to lock the keyboard in Fn mode. When Function is LOCKED, the FN icon will appear on the top annunciator line of the display.
- Press **Fn** once more to return to Abc mode.



Shift: Toggles the casing for alphabet characters between initial case, uppercase and lowercase.

- Press once to toggle from Abc to ABC.
- Press twice to toggle from ABC to abc.
- Press three times to toggle from abc to Abc.



Backspace: Deletes the previous character.



Enter: Moves the insertion point to the next line in a message.

The keyboard provides dual-use keys labeled with alphabetic characters and numbers on the lower half and symbols on the upper half. Press the key combination corresponding to the character you want to enter.

Entering Characters

Characters can be entered using either Uppercase or Lowercase.

- Slide out the QWERTY keyboard and enter your text. By default the Rogue™ is in Initial case and characters then revert back to lowercase.
- 2. Press the desired text key.
 - For example, to enter the word "Sam", type the keyboard sequence helow
 - If you make a mistake and enter the wrong character, press to erase a single character. Press and hold to erase an entire word



Sam

3. To enter all uppercase characters, press to maintain all consecutive characters in uppercase.



Entering Numbers

The keyboard can be used to enter numbers, letters, and symbols. Although these keys default to text (letters), numbers can be input by simply pressing the key associated with the number you want to enter.

Entering Symbols

Symbols can be entered from the keyboard (using the Fn key).

- Position the cursor where you want the symbol to appear within your message.
- Press n and then press the key for the symbol you wish to insert. This method uses the symbols etched on the corresponding QWERTY key.



Entering Smileys

Smileys can be entered from the keyboard. Smileys are entered into text messages to communicate feelings such as pleasure, approval or humor. (Examples: :),;), <3):



=1

Note: You may also create your own quick text. While in the QUICK TEXT screen, touch New . Compose a quick text and touch Save . Your new quick text is added to the top of the selection list.

Entering Text using Touch Screen Keypad

Changing Text Input Mode

When using your phone, you often need to enter text, such as when storing a name in your Contacts List, creating your personal greeting or scheduling events on your calendar. You can enter alphanumeric characters by using your phone's keypad.

- In portrait mode, from a screen where you can enter text, touch the text entry field.
- From the onscreen keypad, touch Abc to change the Text Input mode.

Example: Writing a text message.

- To change the text input mode, touch the Text Input Mode button (bottom left button) and select one of the following options:
 - T9 Word
 - Abc
 - ABC
 - 123
 - Symbols

 Touch the text mode you desire. The entry mode button changes to reflect the mode that you selected. For example, if you selected 1. T9 Word, the entry mode button will display T9 Word.

Note: Text Entry Mode T9 Word, Symbols, or 123 is not available in landscape mode.

Text Input Icons

abc

T9 Word: allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes.

ABC All uppercase: allows you to enter uppercase characters. Ex: HI THERE.

Abc Initial uppercase: allows you to enter initial text in uppercase and all consecutive characters of the same word as lower case. Ex: Hi there

All lowercase: allows you to enter text as lower case.

Ex: hi there.

123 Numeric: allows you to enter numbers. Ex: 123

Symbols Symbols: allows you to insert symbols.

Touch Screen Keypad Icons



Directional key: Allows you to navigate through the the message content.



Hide/Display keypad: Allows you hide and display the keypad.



Backspace: Deletes the previous character.



Shift: Toggles the casing for alphabet characters between initial case, uppercase and lowercase. Case will remain as selected until the Shift key is pressed again.



Next: Only displays when you are in T9 Word mode. Allows you to cycle through words that are related to the keystrokes entered.



Space: Allows you to add spaces between words and characters.

Using T9 Word

T9 Word is a predictive text input mode that allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes. This text input mode is based on a built-in dictionary.

 Touch the Text Input Mode button at the bottom of the screen and touch and select T9Word. When in T9 Word mode, start entering a word by touching the corresponding keys. Touch each key only once for each letter.



The word that you are typing displays on the screen. It may change with each consecutive key that you touch.

2. Enter the whole word before editing or deleting the keystrokes.

Using Abc Mode

To use ABC mode, use the corresponding keys to enter your text.

- Touch the Text Input Mode button at the bottom of the screen and select you want:
 Abc , then touch the key labeled with the letter you want:
 - Once for the first letter, twice for the second letter, and so on.
 - To shift case in ABC mode, touch Shift. There are 3 cases: Initial capital, Caps lock, and Lower case.

Note: By default, the first letter of an entry is capitalized and all consecutive letters are kept in lowercase (unless you touch the Shift key). After entering a character, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

Using 123 Mode

The Numeric mode enables you to enter numbers into a text message.

Touch the Text Input Mode button at the bottom of the screen and select 123, then touch the keys corresponding to the digits you want to enter.

Using Symbols

Symbol mode enables you to insert symbols and punctuation marks into text.

- Touch the Text Input Mode button at the bottom of the screen and select Symbols , then touch the desired symbol key.
- To display more symbols, touch 1/5.
- 3. To clear a symbol entered touch
- 4. Touch Done to return the text field.

Using Domain Extensions

Domain mode allows you to enter preloaded domain extensions such as @, .com, .net, .edu, @hotmail.com, @gmail.com, and @verizon.com.

Note: The Domain Extension icon display only when the To: field is highlighted.

- 1. To enter a domain extension in the 1 (To:), touch select an extension → Done.
- 2. Touch 1/3 to cycle through the Domain Extensions.

Section 7: Messaging

This section explains how to send or receive different types of messages. It also includes the features and functionality associated with messaging.

Types of Messages

Your phone is capable of sending Email, text, picture, video, and voice messages. Send messages by simply entering the Email address or the phone number of the recipient in the To: <......> or Send To field when creating a new message.

Changing Message Settings

This menu allows you to define settings for messages sent or received on your phone. To access your message settings, use the following steps:

- From the Home screen, touch Message →
 Settings. Choose from the following options:
 - Message View: Select either View by Time (allows you to view message by time of receipt.) or View by Contact (allows you to view message by recipients.)



- Entry Mode: Sets the default entry mode for messaging. Choose from T9 Word, Abc, ABC or 123.
- Auto Save Sent: Saves all messages sent. Choose from: On, Off, or Prompt.

- Auto Erase Inbox: Erases the oldest message of the same type (Text or Picture) when the maximum number of received messages of that type is exceeded in the Inbox. For example, When the Inbox exceeds 100 text messages, the first message in the list is replaced with the next incoming message. Picture messages are replaced when the phone's memory is full. Choose from On or Off.
- Messaging Font Size: Allows you to set the messaging font size for messages received.
- TXT Auto View: Automatically displays the text message when received. Choose from On or Off.
- Multimedia Auto Receive: Automatically receives picture, video, and voice messages into your inbox. Choose from On or Off.
- Quick Text: Displays 19 pre-loaded phrases for Text Message, Picture Message and Video Message.
 - **New** creates a new quick text phrase or touch
 - Move changes the order of quick text phrases.
 - Erase erases a quick text phrase.
- Voicemail Setting: Enter the Voicemail phone number to be dialed (if other than the default value of *86).
- Callback #: Allows you to use or edit the number assigned to your handset. Choose from On or Off.
- Signature: Adds the signature text to each message sent. Choose from On or Off.

- Domain Extensions: Allows you to Edit (to edit touch the domain extension.) or Erase any of seven pre-loaded domain extensions or create a New domain extension.
- Preferred Email: Allows you to set the default email client.

Creating and Sending Text Messages

You can send text messages to another mobile phone or to an Email address. For more information about entering text in messages, see "Entering Text Using the QWERTY Keyboard" on page 66.

- Open your device in landscape mode, from the Home screen, touch Message → 1. New Message → 1. TXT Message.
- 2. In the To: field:
 - Touch Contacts to add a recipient from your Contacts List.
 - Touch Recent Calls to add a recipient from your All Calls log.
 - Touch Favorites to add a recipient from a Favorites entry.

 Enter a phone number, contact name or Email address of the recipient. If you have contacts stored in the Contact List, you will see a list of partially matched names in the drop down box. Touch the contact entry or number

Note: If you do not select an option from the menu touch | to return to your message.



Directional key down to move to the Text field. In the Text field, compose your message using the keypad.

Note: At any point while entering text, press the key to access the orange special characters on the keyboard. (The Fn icon will appear on the top line of the display.)

- Touch Options to display additional options. Touch the desired option to perform the function, or to enter its submenu:
 - Paste Text: Allows you to paste copied text into the text field.
 - Save As Draft: Save the message to your Draft folder.
 - Insert Quick Text: Choose from 19 pre-loaded phrases.

- **New** creates a new quick text phrase or touch
- Move changes the order of guick text phrases.
- Erase erases a quick text phrase.
- Add: Allows you to add a graphic, animation, sound, name card, or Spanish symbols.
- Copy Text: Allows you to copy and paste text into the text field. To copy text, slide your finger across the text to highlight and touch Copy. Touch Options → Paste Text to paste the copied text into the text field
- Edit Text Format: Choose size, alignment, style, text color, and text background.
- **Sending Options**: Send the message with a High or Normal priority or choose to display your callback number in the body of the message.
- Cancel Message: Cancels the message and allows you to save it in the Drafts folder.

Note: If you do not select an option from the menu touch return to your message.



To send the message, touch



SEND.

Creating and Sending Picture Messages

Note: Only available within Verizon Wireless Enhanced Services Area.

Picture Messages combines text, picture, and sound. This is also known as Multimedia Messaging (MMS).

Note: Sliding the QWERTY keyboard open immediately after taking a picture opens a New Picture Message screen.

- Open your device in landscape mode, from the Home screen, touch Message → 1. New Message → 2. Picture Message.
- 2. In the To: field:
 - Touch Contacts to add a recipient from your Contacts List.
 - Touch Recent Calls to add a recipient from your All Calls log.
 - Touch Favorites to add a recipient from a Favorites entry.

- Touch Blogs to post to a blog from your Online Album.
- Enter a phone number, contact name or Email address
 of the recipient. If you have contacts stored in the
 Contact List, you will see a list of partially matched
 names in the drop down box. Touch the contact entry or
 number

Note: If you do not select an option from the menu touch to return to your message.

Note: Once you have entered a recipient(s) in the 1 (To:) field the remaining fields are optional.

 Press the Directional key down to move to the Text field. In the Text field, compose your message using the keypad.

Note: At any point while entering text, press the orange special characters on the keyboard. (The Fn icon will appear on the top line of the display.)

4. Touch Options to display additional options. Touch the desired option to perform the function, or to enter its submenu:

- Paste Text: Allows you to paste copied text into the text field.
- Preview: Shows the message before it is sent.
- Save As Draft: Saves the message to your Draft folder.
- Insert Quick Text: Choose from 19 pre-loaded phrases.
 - **New** creates a new quick text phrase or touch
 - Move changes the order of quick text phrases.
 - Erase erases a quick text phrase.
- Copy Text: Allows you to copy and paste text into the text field. To copy text, slide your finger across the text to highlight and touch Copy. Touch Options → Paste Text to paste the copied text into the text field.
- Add Slide: Allows you to insert multiple pictures into a picture message.
- Remove Slide: Remove a slide from your message.
- **Priority Level**: Sends the message with a High or Normal priority.
- Cancel Message: Cancels the message and allows you to save it in the Drafts folder.
- Spanish Symbols: Inserts Spanish symbols such as Ñ.

Note: The Remove Slide option is available only when at least one picture has been inserted into the picture message.

Note: If you do not select an option from the menu touch close return to your message.

Press the Directional key down to move to the Picture field and press Enter. Touch the image you want to insert into the message and touch Add.

To capture a new image:

- Touch the **Camera** button to take a new picture.
- Press ♀/¹a Camera/Camcorder key to capture the image.
- Touch to save and insert the image into your message.
- You are automatically moved to the **Sound** field. Press

 Inter to open the **My Sounds** menu. Touch the sound you want to insert into the message or touch **Record New** to record a new sound.
- You are automatically moved to the Subject field. Using the keypad enter the subject of your message.

- 8. Press the Directional key down to move to the Name Card field. Press Enter to select My Name Card or an entry from your Contacts list. Follow the prompts and touch to insert.
- 9. Once all fields are complete, touch Send SEND.

Creating and Sending Video Messages

You can send video messages to another mobile phone or to an Email address.

Note: Sliding the QWERTY keyboard open immediately after taking a video opens a New Video Message screen.

Note: To remove the recording, touch the Voice field → Remove. Touch Change to replace the recording.

 Press the Directional key down to highlight the Text field. In the text field, compose your message using the keypad. Note: At any point while entering text, press the lakey to access the orange special characters on the keyboard. (The Fn icon will appear on the top line of the display.)

- 6. Touch Options to display additional options. Touch the desired option to perform the function for the option, or to enter its sub-menu:

Therefore you need to retrieve new messages to your phone and read them on the phone.

Receive Messages While in a Call

When you receive a message while in a call, the NEW TXT
MESSAGE or NEW MULTIMEDIA MESSAGE pop-up box
appears in the display. Touch View Now or View Later.

Note: Only text messages can be viewed during a call. Multimedia messages cannot be downloaded during a call.

Touch the unopened message. The **Inbox** screen appears first with information about the message.

View a Text, Picture, Video or Voice Message Later

- When you receive a new Text, Picture, Video or Voice message that you would like to view later, touch View Later. The message will be stored in the Inbox.
- To view the stored message, from the Home screen, touch Message.
- Touch 2. Messages.

Receiving a Text Message

Messages Folder

When your phone receives a Text, Picture, Video, or Voice message, it places it in your Messages folder.

Note: To quickly view all messages in the Inbox, Sent, or Drafts folders, open one message and touch and slide the message left to view the next message or touch and slide the message right to view the previous message.

Messages

The Messages folder displays when the Message view is by contact.

Note: Messaging menu depends upon the Messages View setting. For more information, refer to "Changing Message Settings" on page 73.

Messages view by contacts

Message View by Contact groups all messages sent to or received from a contact in one combined Messages folder.

Note: From the Messaging menu, you can quickly switch the Messages View by scrolling up and touching 0. Settings and touching the Message View drop down menu and touch Contacts. Messages View is By Contact, displays all messages sent and received from a Contact sorted by time.

- From the Messaging menu.
- Touch 2. Messages.
- 3. Touch one of the following options:
 - New creates a new TXT Message, Picture Message, Video Message, or Voice Message.
 - Sort arranges your TXT Message, Picture Message, Video Message, or Voice Message by (i.e. most recent first), name, or size.

Inbox

The Inbox folder displays when the Message view is by time.

Note: Messaging menu depends upon the Messages View setting. For more information, refer to "Changing Message Settings" on page 73.

Messages view by time

Note: If Messages View is By Time, then you will see all received messages in your Inbox folder and all sent messages in your Sent folder in reverse chronological order.

Message View by time separates received and sent messages into the Inbox and Sent folder.

Sent

Your phone stores messages in the Sent folder, when Messages View is By Time, regardless of whether the message was successfully transmitted.

Bluetooth Menu

About Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology capable of exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet without requiring a physical connection.

Unlike infrared, you don't need to line up the devices to beam information with Bluetooth. If the devices are within a range of one another, you can exchange information between them, even if they are located in different rooms.

Note: When connected to your Bluetooth headset, touch the multi-function key on the headset to use Voice Commands's Voice Dial feature.

Bluetooth Service Profiles

The Bluetooth specification is a protocol that describes how the short-range wireless technology works, where individual profiles describe the services supported by individual devices. Profiles reduce the chance that different devices will not work together.

Your Roque™ supports the following Bluetooth profile services:

- Voice Calls are supported using the following, depending on the accessory:
 - HSP Headset
 - HFP Hands-free profiles*
- Transfer Object allows sending an **OPP** Object Push Profile which allows transfer of vCard (i.e., Contact information) between devices.
- Bluetooth Stereo uses A2DP Advanced Audio Distribution Profile and AVRCP - Audio/Video Remote Control Profile.
- Printing is supported using BIP Basic Imaging or BPP Basic Printing Profiles.
- Automobile Kits can use any of the following: HFP Hands-free or PBAP - Phone Book Access Profiles*
- Connectivity Connections (i.e. computer) are supported using SPP -Serial Port (connecting two BT devices).

Bluetooth Settings

The Bluetooth wireless technology settings menu provides the ability to view and change the device name, show the visibility, and set the security for the device.

Memory

My Ringtones

V CAST is your link to video on demand, which allows you to view or download video clips that contain breaking news, sports highlights, weather and more.





To return to the Home screen, press the End/Power key.

Editing a Playlist

The songs you selected are imported to **V CAST Music with Rhapsody**.

Section 11: Camera and Camcorder

This section explains how to use the camera on your phone. You can take photographs and shoot video by using the built-in camcorder functionality. Your 3.0 megapixel camera produces photos in JPEG format.

Important!: Do not take photos of people without their permission.

Do not take photos in places where cameras are not allowed.

Do not take photos in places where you may interfere with another person's privacy.

Using the Camera

Taking Photos

Taking pictures with your device's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the camera, then pressing the camera key.

Note: When taking a photo in direct sunlight or in bright conditions, shadows may appear on the photo.

- Press the Camera/Camcorder key \$\infty\alpha\rightarrow\$ to activate the camera mode.
 - or -

From the Home screen, touch Menu → Menu → Media Center → 2. Picture & Video → 5. Take Pictures.

- Using the phone's main display screen as a viewfinder, adjust the image by aiming the camera at the subject.
- Press the Camera/Camcorder key (**)/** to take picture. (The picture will automatically be stored within your designated storage location. If no microSD is installed, all pictures will be stored on the Phone.) For more information, refer to "Camera Options" on page 136.



Note: Immediately after taking a photo, open the device in landscape mode to automatically start a new picture message with the photo taken attached. For more information, refer to "Creating and Sending Picture Messages" on page 76.

- If desired, before taking the photo, you can touch onscreen icons to access various camera options.
- 5. Press 👆 to return to the picture viewer.

Camera Options

Camera options are represented by icons across both sides of the screen.



Back: allows you to return to the Home screen.



Mode: allows you to switch to camcorder mode.



Shooting mode: allows you to set the shooting mode. Options are:

- Single: takes a single photo and view it before returning to the shooting mode.
- Multi shot: takes a succession of consecutive photos by pressing and holding the Camera key.
- Panorama shot: takes photo by taking an initial photo and then adding 7 additional images for a total of 8 images, which can be combined together. The guide box lets you view the area where the second part of the panoramic picture should fall within.

- Mosaic shot: allows you to piece together several photos to create a mosaic. There are 18 mosaic templates to choose from.
- Frame shot: allows you to choose a custom frame border for your image. Choose from one of the 18 available frames. Touch the frame to assign.



Settings: allows you to customize your camera settings. Choose the following options and touch \mathbb{OK} .



Camera tab:

- Timer: allows you to set a time delay before the camera takes the photo or the camcorder begins recording video.
 Options include: Off, 3 seconds, 5 seconds, or 10 seconds.
- . Autoshot: allows you to set On or Off.
- Auto Focus: allows you to set to Normal, Macro, or Off.
- Quality: allows you to set the image quality to: Fine, Normal, or Economy.
- Effects: allows you to change the color tone or apply special effects to the photo. Options include: Normal, Black & White, Antique, Aqua or Negative.

- Contrast: allows you to set the contrast level.
- Saturation: allows you to set the saturation level.
- . Sharpness: allows you to set the sharpness level.
- White Balance: allows you to set this option from the following choices: Auto, Sunny, Cloudy, Fluorescent, or Tungsten.
- ISO: Auto, ISO 100, ISO 200 and ISO 400.
- Metering: allows you to set how the camera measures or meters the light source: Average, Center, Spot.



Settings tab:

- Guidelines: allows you to turn the guidelines On or Off.
- Review: allows you to activate the instant review feature where images are displayed immediately after review (On or Off).
- Ready Sound: allows you to select a tone to play when you press the Camera/Camcorder key.
- Shutter Sound: allows you to select a tone to play when the camera's shutter opens and closes. Sound selections are Off, Shutter, OK or Melody.

 Memory: allows you to configure the default storage location for images/videos as either Phone or Memory Card (if inserted).



Flash: allows you to set the camera flash to Off, Auto, Only This Shot or On.



Resolution: allows you to set the image size to either: 2048x1536, 1920x1080, 1600x1200, 1280x720, 1024x768, 800x480, 640x480 or 320x240.




Brightness: allows you to adjust the brightness level by moving the slider across the page.



Quick view: allows you to access the options page for a selected image/video. Options include: Play slideshow, Edit, Information, Send, Set as, Delete, and Return to previous page.

After you have taken a photo or shot a video, you can access various options from the Pictures/Video Folder page.

 - Effect: allows you to choose from among several effects.
 - Revision: allows you to adjust image Brightness manually or select preloaded Brightness settings.
 - Merge: allows you to merge two photos.
- Copy & Paste: allows you to copy a complete photo or a section of a photo and paste in another photo by resolution.
- Resize: allows you to Resize your photo.
- Rotate/Flip: allows you to Rotate, and Flip the image.
- Save: allows you to save changes.

Note: Set As is not an available feature when the camcorder mode is active.

- Dynamic Canvas (): allows you to select a color, then handwrite a message onto the current image. Touch to store the new changes.
 - Back: returns you to the previous screen.
- **Pen**: allows you to set the tool for entering handwritten text or shapes.
- Thickness: allows you to set the line thickness of handwritten text and shapes.
- Color: allows you to set the color of handwritten text or shapes.
- Motion: allows you to add animation to handwritten text.
- Preview: allows you to preview photo before its saved.
- Save: allows you to save changes.
- Erase: allows you to erase unwanted content.
- Send via (): lets you send the currently active image as part of a new multimedia message, or to an external device via Bluetooth.
- Erase (iii): erases the currently selected image/video.
- Information (): displays file information such as name, format, size, resolution, etc.

My Pictures

Allows you to view and manage pictures stored in your device.

From the Home screen, touch Menu → Menu → Media Center → 2. Picture & Video → 3. My Pictures.

If you touch **Options** before selecting a photo, the following options appear:

- Erase: Allows you to erase selected picture files.
- **Slide Show**: Allows you to create a slide show with selected pictures.
- Print: Allows you to print selected photo.
- Move: Allows you to move selected pictures that are not locked from the phone's internal memory to a memory card, or from a memory card to the phone's internal memory.

Note: The Move option is only visible when a memory card is inserted.

- Lock/Unlock: Allows you to lock selected pictures to prevent accidental deletion, Unlock, allows you to unlock selected pictures.
- Touch a photo to view the picture. Touch Options to select from the appropriate options.

 - Rotate/Flip: Allows you to rotate the selected picture in incremental steps or flip the picture either horizontally or vertically.
- **Rename**: Allows you to rename the selected picture.
- File Info: Provides the date, time, resolution, size and rights to the selected picture.
- Touch to make your selection.

Viewing Options

Calculator

Allows you to perform simple mathematical calculations.

Normal

- From the Home screen, touch MENU → MENU → Settings & Tools → 2. Tools → 2. Calculator → 1. Normal. The Calculator opens.
- Enter the first number in your equation using the touch keypad or QWERTY keyboard. Numbers can be up to eight digits total.
- 3. Touch to clear a single number or equation or touch to clear the entire data entered.
- **4.** Touch the function keys to set the type of calculation that you wish to perform. Your choices are as follows:



- Multiplication
 - Division
- Use the touch keypad to enter the second number into your equation.
- **6.** Touch to perform the calculation and view the results.

Tip

Calculates the tip and how much each person should pay.

Note: The following steps outline tip calculations using the touch keypad.

The Converter provides several conversion categories.

There are three fields at the top of the display: category type (1), subcategory (2), with the units of measure or money, and the entry field (3).

The units of measure for the conversion (4), is near the bottom of the display.

Disable an alarm before it sounds

- . Search: loads the search page.
- History: gives you a history of previously accessed web sites.
- Display Mode: choose from Standard, Page Overview, Fixed Width, or Text Only options.
 - Standard: displays a standard Browser screen with portrait and landscape page navigation.

- Page Overview: displays the entire screen in the display. Move the highlighted frame to the part of the webpage you would like to zoom in and view.
- Fixed Width: displays the complete Browser in the display. Only portrait page navigation.
- Text Only: displays only text and excludes images used in the Web page.
- Send URL: opens a New TXT Message screen and allows you to send the current URL.
- Settings: allows you to change browser options.
 - Home Page: allows you to set the URL for the home page.
 - JavaScript: Turns JavaScript On/Off.
 - Touch Sound: allows you to set the touch sound for the display when it's touched.
 - Security: sets the security parameter when searching the web
 - Zoom Default: allows you to set the zoom percentage when zooming in on a web page.
 - Manage Memory: deletes specific or all internet files from your device temporary memory. It is important that these files are deleted as some of these file can store personal information which can pose a security risk if not properly managed.

- Restore Defaults: restores factory default settings.
- FLASH Plug-in: allows you to view allows you to view FLASH inside of a web page. For more information, refer to "Flash Content" on page 168.
- Information: gives you current Web Page and Browser Information.
- Copy Text: allows you to copy and paste text.

Note: The Paste option only displays when text has been copied.

Changing the Orientation of the Web page

The Rogue[™] comes equipped with an orientation detector that can tell if the phone is portrait or landscape orientation. The slide does not have to be open to view content in landscape mode.

Viewing the Page in Full Screen Mode

RSS Feeds

RSS (Really Simple Syndication) is a family of web feed formats used to publish frequently updated content such as blog entries, news headlines or podcasts. An RSS document, which is also called a feed, web feed, or channel, contains either a summary of content from an associated web site or the full text. RSS makes it possible for people to keep up with their favorite web sites in an automated manner that is easier than checking them manually.

To add an RSS feed, you must first be on a website that supports RSS.

- 2. Touch Menu → 3. Subscribe.

Note: If 3. Subscribe is not available, then the website does not support RSS feeds.

Health and Safety Information

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals Certification Information (SAR)

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. government.

These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE).

In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of

absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg).

The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC.

For body worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the handset a minimum of 1.5 cm from the body.

Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are:

- Head: 1.36 W/Kg.
- · Body-worn: 0.673 W/Kg.

SAR information on this and other model phones can be viewed online at http://www.fcc.gov/oet/ea. To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone.

Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies.

When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at

far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiationemitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user.

In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- · National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Federal Communications Commission
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones.

Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of

the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.

Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phones RF exposures.

However, none of the studies can answer questions about longterm exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of

animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years' follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer.

This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization international Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

FDA and Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations.

CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

 If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was

strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that handsfree kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing

more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims.

According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested

wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

Road Safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands free accessories available today.

- Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voicemail answer it for you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.

- 7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies.
- 9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10. Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

Responsible Listening

Caution!: Avoid potential hearing loss.

Damage to hearing occurs when a person is exposed to loud sounds over time. The risk of hearing loss increases as sound is played louder and for longer durations. Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cellular telephones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise-induced hearing loss. This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds, and Bluetooth or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound and distorted hearing.

Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and potential hearing problem varies. Additionally, the amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device settings, and the headphones that are used. As a result, there is no single volume setting that is appropriate for everyone or for every combination of sound, settings and equipment.

You should follow some commonsense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you
 choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, use
 noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental
 noise. By blocking background environment noise, noise cancelling
 headphones should allow you to hear the music at lower volumes than
 when using earbuds.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before you hearing could be affected.

- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you
 experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech or experience
 any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio
 device. discontinue use and consult your doctor.

Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.

When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder if you are using an external antenna).

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Implantable Medical Devices

A minimum separation of six (6) inches should be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or implantable cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the device.

Persons who have such devices:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six (6) inches from their implantable medical device when the phone is turned ON;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimize the potential for interference:
- Should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place;
- Should read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your wireless phone with such a device, consult your health care provider.

FCC Hearing-Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

On July 10, 2003, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Report and Order in WT Docket 01-309 modified the exception of wireless phones under the Hearing Aid Compatibility Act of 1988 (HAC Act) to require digital wireless phones be compatible with hearing-aids.

The intent of the HAC Act is to ensure reasonable access to telecommunications services for persons with hearing disabilities.

While some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.


The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless phones, to assist hearing device users find phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise. The hearing aid and wireless phone rating values are then added together. A sum of 5 is considered acceptable for normal use. A sum of 6 is considered for best use.



In the above example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless phone meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equal M5. This is synonymous for T ratings. This should provide the hearing aid user with "normal usage" while

using their hearing aid with the particular wireless phone.
"Normal usage" in this context is defined as a signal quality that is acceptable for normal operation.

The M mark is intended to be synonymous with the U mark. The T mark is intended to be synonymous with the UT mark. The M and T marks are recommended by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industries Solutions (ATIS). The U and UT marks are referenced in Section 20.19 of the FCC Rules.

The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You

should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

Restricting Children's access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your phone bill.

FCC Notice and Cautions

FCC Notice

The phone may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the phone if such interference cannot be eliminated.

Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association:

Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment, and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

Other Important Safety Information

 Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.

- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phone in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

Product Performance

Getting the Most Out of Your Signal Reception

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal.

If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key.

Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- To ensure that the Hearing Aid Compatibility rating for your phone is maintained, secondary transmitters such as Bluetooth and WLAN components must be disabled during a call.
- If your phone is equipped with an external antenna, hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended and over your shoulder.
- Do not hold, bend or twist the phone's antenna, if applicable.
- Do not use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- If your phone is equipped with an internal antenna, obstructing the internal antenna could inhibit call performance.
- Speak directly into the phone's receiver.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it is inoperable, call Customer Care for service.

Availability of Various Features/Ring Tones

Many services and features are network dependent and may require additional subscription and/or usage charges. Not all features are available for purchase or use in all areas.

Downloadable Ring Tones may be available at an additional cost. Other conditions and restrictions may apply. See your service provider for additional information.

Battery Standby and Talk Time

Standby and talk times will vary depending on phone usage patterns and conditions. Battery power consumption depends on factors such as network configuration, signal strength, operating temperature, features selected, frequency of calls, and voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Battery Precautions

- Avoid dropping the cell phone. Dropping it, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage to the phone and battery. If you suspect damage to the phone or battery, take it to a service center for inspection.
- . Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Do not modify or remanufacture the battery as this could result in serious safety hazards.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Follow battery usage, storage and charging guidelines found in the user's guide.

- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. - Misuse or use of incompatible phones, batteries, and charging devices could result in damage to the equipment and a possible risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other serious hazard.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.

- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0 °C (32 °F).
- Do not place the phone in areas that may get very hot, such as on or near a cooking surface, cooking appliance, iron, or radiator.

 between the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the
 battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or
 bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the
 object causing the short-circuiting.
- Do not permit a battery out of the phone to come in contact with metal objects, such as coins, keys or jewelry.
- Do not crush, puncture or put a high degree of pressure on the battery as this can cause an internal short-circuit, resulting in overheating.

 Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.
