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Getting to Know Your Phone





Power key

- Press and hold to power on, turn on/off airplane mode, restart the phone, or power off.
- Press to turn off or on the screen display.

Home key

Touch to return to the home screen from any application or screen.

Back key

Touch to go to the previous screen.

Recent apps key

Touch to see recently used applications.

Volume key

Press or hold to turn the volume up or down.

Starting Up

Switch off your phone before installing or replacing the battery or the nano-SIM card. The microSDHC[™] card (not included) is optional and can be installed and removed while the phone is turned on. Unmount the microSDHC card before removing it.

1. Place your finger in the slot at the bottom of the back cover to lift and remove the cover.



Hold the nano-SIM card with the cut corner oriented as shown and slide it into the card holder.





- To avoid damage to the phone, do not use any other kind of SIM card, or any non-standard nano-SIM card cut from a SIM card. You can get a standard nano-SIM card from your service provider.
- This device uses a nano-SIM card only.



 Hold the microSDHC card (not included) with the cut corner oriented as shown and slide it into the card slot.





Some applications may require a microSDHC card to work normally or may store certain data on it. Therefore, it is recommended that you keep a microSDHC card (sold separately) installed and not remove or replace it randomly.

4. Insert the battery by aligning the metal contacts on the battery with the metal contacts in the battery compartment. Gently push down on the battery until it locks into place.



Align the back cover with the back of the phone and press the cover back into place. Ensure that all the tabs are secure and there are no gaps around the cover.

Charging the Battery

 Connect the adapter to the charging jack. Ensure that the adapter is inserted with the correct orientation. Do not force the connector into the charging jack.



- 2. Connect the charger to a standard AC power outlet.
- 3. Disconnect the charger when the battery is fully charged.

NOTE:

If the battery is extremely low, you may be unable to power on the phone even when it is being charged. In this case, try again after charging the phone for at least 10 minutes.

Powering On/Off Your Phone

Ensure that the battery is charged before powering on.

- Press and hold the **Power** key to turn on your phone.
- To turn it off, press and hold the Power key to open the options menu. Touch Power off.

Getting to Know the Home Screen

The home screen is the starting point for your phone's applications, functions, and menus. You can customize your home screen by adding application shortcuts, folders, widgets, and more.





Your home screen extends beyond the initial screen, providing more space for shortcuts, widgets, and folders. Simply swipe left or right to see the extended home screens.

Opening Applications

- 1. Touch the **Home** key if the current screen is not the home screen.
- 2. Touch 🛄.
- 3. Slide left or right on the screen and touch an app to open it.

Adding Shortcuts

- Touch the Home key > .
- 2. Touch and hold an app icon and drag it to the home screen.

Adding Widgets

- 1. Touch and hold a blank part of the home screen.
- 2. Touch WIDGETS.
- 3. Touch and hold a widget and drag it to the home screen.

Removing Shortcuts or Widgets

- 1. Touch and hold a widget or shortcut on the home screen.
- 2. Drag it to Remove to remove it.

Organizing Shortcuts With

Folders

- 1. Touch and hold a shortcut on the home screen.
- Drag the shortcut icon over another and release your finger. A new folder is created and both shortcuts are added into the folder.
- 3. If needed, drag more shortcuts and drop them into the folder.

Applying New Wallpapers

- 1. Touch and hold a blank part of the home screen.
- 2. Touch WALLPAPERS.
- Choose the image or animation you want to use as the wallpaper and touch Set wallpaper.

Setting Ringtone and Sound

Setting Ringtone or Notification

Sound

- 1. Touch the Home key > 😳 > Settings > Sound & notification.
- 2. Touch Phone ringtone or Default notification ringtone.
- 3. Select the ringtone you want to use.
- 4. Touch OK.

Setting System Tones

- Touch the Home key > :::: > Settings > Sound & notification > other sounds.
- 2. Turn on the types of sound you want to hear or turn off those you do not need.

Adjusting Volume

To adjust call volume, press the **Volume** key while on a call. To adjust other types of volume, follow the steps below.

- 1. Touch the Home key > 😳 > Settings > Sound & notification.
- 2. Drag the sliders to adjust the volume for media, the ringtone volume, and the alarm volume.

Setting a Screen Lock

You can protect your phone by creating a screen lock. When it is enabled, you need to swipe the screen, draw a pattern, or enter a numeric PIN or password to unlock the phone's screen and keys.

- Touch the Home key > : > Settings > Security > Screen lock.
- 2. Touch None, Swipe, Pattern, PIN or Password.
 - Touch None to disable the screen lock feature.
 - Touch Swipe to enable unlock with a 'swipe' or 'drag' gesture.
 - Touch Pattern to create a pattern that you must draw to unlock the screen.
 - Touch PIN or Password to set a numeric PIN or a password you must enter to unlock your screen.

Checking Voicemail

- Touch the Home Key > \$\$\$ > \$\$\$
- In the dialer tab, touch and hold 1 key. If prompted, enter your voicemail password.
- 3. Follow the voice prompts to listen to and manage your voicemail messages.

Making a Call

- Touch the Home Key > \$\$ > \$\$
- In the dialer tab, enter the phone number with the on-screen keypad. Touch to delete incorrect digits.
- 3. Touch **U** below the keypad to place the call.



To call a contact, touch the **Home Key** > **>** and touch a contact or a number.

Wi-Fi Calling

Wi-Fi Calling allows you to make and receive phone calls and messages over Wi-Fi connection.

Adding Contacts

Creating a New Contact

- 1. Touch the Home Key > 🗾 and touch the all contacts tab ALL CONTACTS.
- 2. Touch 🙁
- 3. Enter the contact name, phone numbers, email addresses, and other information, as shown.
- Touch More Field to enter other information
- Touch to save the contact.



Importing Contacts in Batches

- Touch the Home Key >
- 2. Touch : > Import/export > Import from SIM card or Import from .vcf file.
- 3. If prompted, select an account in which to save the contacts.
- For importing from the SIM card, touch all the SIM contacts you want to import and touch OK.

For importing from .vcf file, select the vCard file(s) and to begin importing.

Sending a Message

- 1. Touch the **Home Key** > $\stackrel{\text{We}}{=}$.
- 2. On the **Messaging** screen, touch 🔮 at the bottom.
- 3. Add recipients by one of the following ways.
 - Touch the To field and manually enter the recipient's number the contact name. If the phone presents a few suggestions, touch the one you want to add.
 - Select recipients from your contacts by touching 2.
- 4. Touch the **Send message** field and enter the content of your text message.
- Touch I to attach a file to the message (such as pictures, videos, audio files, etc...).

Connecting With a Bluetooth Headset

- 1. Touch the Home key > 🔛 > Settings > Bluetooth.
- Touch the Bluetooth switch if it is off. When Bluetooth is on, the ³ icon appears in the status bar.

💋 NOTE:

Your phone automatically scans for and displays the IDs of all available Bluetooth devices in range. Touch **> Refresh** if you want to scan again.

- Touch the ID of the headset, or any other device you want to pair with your phone. Touch PAIR or enter a passcode if prompted.
- If necessary, touch the ID of the paired headset to connect with it.

💋 NOTE:

Touch 🔅 next to the connected device then touch **FORGET** to end the connection.

Installing Apps From the Google Play™ Store

Google Play has tens of thousands of games and applications for you to use and enjoy. Before you begin, make sure that you have signed in to your Google account.

NOTE:

The content you can access in the Play Store depends on your region and your service provider.

The first time you launch **Play Store**, accept the Google Play Terms of Service.

- 2. Find the apps you need either by category or by touching the search box at the top.
- 3. Touch the app to see detailed description.

 Touch INSTALL (free apps) or the price (paid apps) and follow the on-screen instructions to continue. If the app is not free, you need to sign in to your Google Wallet™ account and select a payment method.

Lightly touch or press either end of the Volume key.

Recording a Video

- 1. Touch the Home key > 😳 > Camera.
- 2. Touch 🖸 > 🔽 to switch to camcorder.
- 3. Aim the camera at the subject and make any necessary adjustment.
- 4. Touch is to start and is to stop recording.

NOTE:

While the recording is in progress, you can touch to pause the recording.

Playing Music

- 1. Touch the Home key > 😐 > Play Music.
- 2. Touch **=** > Music library.
- Touch a category, such as ARTISTS or AIBUMS, to find the song you want to play.
- Touch the song to play it back. When the song is playing, touch the album artwork to display more options.

Connecting via Wi-Fi

Your phone automatically searches for Wi-Fi networks in range and displays their names and security settings. Your phone also connects to previously linked networks when they are in range.

3. Touch a network name to connect to it.

If the network is secured, enter a password or other credentials. (Ask your network administrator for details.)

Connecting via Mobile Network

To connect to the Internet via mobile network you can use the default Access Point Names (APN). If you want to add a new APN, please contact the service provider to get the necessary information. Do not change the default settings unless instructed by the service provider. Otherwise the service might stop working.

Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

This phone is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the United States.

During SAR testing, this device was set to transmit at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands, and placed in positions that simulate RF exposure in usage against the head with no separation, and near the body with the separation of XX mm. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the device while operating can be well below the maximum value.

This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

The exposure standard for wireless devices employing a unit of measurement is known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6 W/kg. This device is complied with SAR for general population /uncontrolled exposure limits in ANSI/IEEE C95.1-1992 and had been tested in accordance with the measurement methods and procedures specified in IEEE1528.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. For this device, the highest reported SAR value for usage against the head is X.XXX W/kg, for usage near the body is X.XXX W/kg.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirements.

Normal Use Position

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone to your ear, with the bottom toward your mouth.

Air Bags

Do not place your phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area as an airbag inflates with great force and serious injury could occur.

Place your phone safely before driving your vehicle.

Seizures/Blackouts

Your phone can produce a bright or flashing light. A small percentage of people may be susceptible to blackouts or seizures (even if they have never had one before) when exposed to flashing lights or light patterns such as when playing games or watching videos. If you have experienced seizures or blackouts or have a family history of such occurrences, please consult a physician. To reduce the risk of blackouts or seizures, you can use your phone in a well-lit room and take frequent breaks.

Repetitive Strain Injuries

To minimize the risk of Repetitive Strain Injury (RSI) when texting or playing games with your phone:

- Do not grip the phone too tightly.

- Use the special features which are designed to minimize the times of pressing buttons, such as Message Templates and Predictive Text.

Faulty and Damaged Products

Do not attempt to disassemble the phone or its accessories.

Only qualified personnel can service or repair the phone or its accessories.

If your phone (or its accessories) has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you have taken it to be checked at an authorized service center.

Radio Frequency Interference

General Statement on Interference

Care must be taken when using your phone in close proximity to personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids.

Please consult your doctor and the device manufacturers to determine if the operation of your phone may interfere with the operation of your medical devices.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 cm be maintained between a mobile phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. To achieve this, use the phone on the opposite ear to your pacemaker and do not carry it in a breast pocket.

Hearing Aids

People with hearing aids or other cochlear implants may experience interfering noises when using wireless devices or when one is nearby.

The level of interference will depend on the type of hearing device and the distance from the interference source, increasing the separation between them may reduce the interference. You may also consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Medical Equipment

Switch off your wireless device when you are requested to do so in hospitals, clinics or health care facilities. These requests are designed to prevent possible interference with sensitive medical equipment.

Aircraft

Switch off your wireless device whenever you are instructed to do so by airport or airline staff.

Consult the airline staff about the use of wireless devices on board the aircraft and enable airplane mode of your phone when boarding an aircraft.

Interference in Vehicles

Please note that because of possible interference to electronic equipment, some vehicle manufacturers forbid the use of mobile phones in their vehicles unless a hands-free kit with an external antenna is included in the installation.

Explosive Environments Gas Stations and Explosive

Atmospheres

In locations with potentially explosive atmospheres, obey all posted signs to turn off wireless devices such as your phone or other radio equipment.

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres include fuelling areas, below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders.

Blasting Caps and Areas

Power off your mobile phone or wireless device when in a blasting area or in areas where signs are posted to power off "two-way radios" or "electronic devices" to avoid interfering with blasting operations.
