## In-call options

During a call, select **Spkr on** to turn the speakerphone on.

## Redial

- 1 Press > Call centre > Call history and select Missed calls, Dialled calls or Received calls.
- 2 Scroll to the contact you want to call and then press Call .

#### Save a contact

- **1** Enter a number using the number keys.
- 2 Press Options > Save to Phonebook > Add new contact or Replace existing.
















# Create & send messages

When you receive a message, your phone plays an alert and shows the new message indicator at the top of the screen.

To read the new message, select View.

To read messages stored in your inbox, select -> Messaging > Inbox.



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# Bluetooth™ wireless

**Note:** To extend battery life, turn off Bluetooth power when not in use.



To connect with a new device, you need to pair with it. You only need to do this once for each device—to connect again, see "Reconnect devices" on page 16.

- 1 Make sure the device you are pairing with is in discoverable mode (see device instructions).
- 2 Select > Settings > Connectivity > Bluetooth > Search audio device.
- **3** Your phone lists the devices it finds within range. Select a device to connect.
- 4 If necessary, enter the device passkey (like 0000) to connect to the device.

# **Text entry**

# Security

help keep your phone safe

### Codes & passwords

Your phone password is originally set to **1234**. If your service provider didn't change the phone password, you should change it:

Find it: □ > ♥ Settings > Security settings > Change password > Phone password.

You can also change your SIM card  ${\bf PIN}$  and  ${\bf PIN2}$  codes.



If you forget your phone password: At the **Enter password** prompt, try entering **1234** or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, contact your service provider.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your SIM PIN code or PIN2 code, contact your service provider.

### Lock your phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. You'll need to enter the phone password to lock or unlock your phone.



Crash recovery

In the unlikely event that your phone stops responding to key presses, try a quick reset. Remove the back cover and battery ("Assemble & charge" on page 4), then replace and turn on your phone as usual.

Reset

Reset default factory settings on your phone.

**Caution:** This option erases all information you have entered (including contacts and calendar entries) and content you have downloaded (including pictures, videos and music files) stored in your phone's memory. After you erase the information, you cannot recover it. This option does not delete SIM card or memory card information.

# Safety, regulatory & legal

# Battery use & safety

Important: Handle and store batteries properly to avoid injury or damage. Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries, and particularly from the continued use of damaged batteries.

#### DON'Ts

- . Don't disassemble, crush, puncture, shred or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery.
- Don't let the mobile device or battery come into contact with water.\* Water can get into the mobile device's circuits, leading to corrosion. If the mobile device and/or battery get wet, get them checked by your service provider or contact Motorola, even if they appear to be working properly.\*
- Don't allow the battery to touch metal objects. If metal objects, such as iewellery, stay in prolonged contact with the battery contact points, the battery could become very hot.
- Don't place your mobile device or battery near a heat source.\* Excessive heat can damage the mobile device or the battery. High temperatures can cause the battery to swell, leak or malfunction. Therefore:
- Don't dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.

#### DOs

- Do avoid dropping the battery or mobile device.\* Dropping these items, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage.\*
- Do contact your service provider or Motorola if your mobile device or battery has been damaged by being dropped or by high temperatures.
- \* Note: Always make sure that the battery compartment is closed and secure to avoid direct exposure of the battery to any of these conditions.

Important: Use Motorola Original products for quality assurance and safeguards. To aid consumers in identifying authentic Motorola batteries from non-original or counterfeit batteries (that may not have adequate safety protection),






















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Motorola provides holograms on its batteries. Consumers should confirm that any battery they purchase has a "Motorola Original" hologram.

Motorola recommends that you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers. Motorola mobile devices are designed to work with Motorola batteries. If you see a message on your display such as Invalid battery or Unable to charge, take the following steps:

- Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it has a "Motorola Original" hologram;
- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a Motorola battery:
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and try charging it again;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola authorised service centre.

Important: Motorola's warranty does not cover damage to the mobile device caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.

**Warning:** Use of a non-Motorola battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage or other hazard.

Proper and safe battery disposal and recycling: Proper battery disposal is not only important for safety, it also benefits the environment. Consumers may recycle their used batteries in many retail or service provider locations. Additional information on proper disposal and recycling may be found on the web:

# **Battery charging**

Notes for charging your product's battery:

- During charging, keep your battery and charger near room temperature for efficient battery charging.
- New batteries are not fully charged.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Motorola batteries and charging systems have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

















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# **Driving precautions**

Responsible and safe driving is your primary responsibility when behind the wheel of a vehicle. Using a mobile device or accessory for a call or other application while driving may cause distraction. Using a mobile device or accessory may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas, always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

#### While driving, NEVER:

- Type or read texts.
- . Enter or review written data.
- Surf the web.
- Input navigation information.
- Perform any other functions that divert your attention from driving.

#### While driving, ALWAYS:

- Keep your eyes on the road.
- Use a hands-free device if available or required by law in your area.
- · Enter destination information into a navigation device before driving.
- Use voice activated features (such as voice dial) and speaking features (such as audible directions), if available.
- Obey all local laws and regulations for the use of mobile devices and accessories in the vehicle.
- End your call or other task if you cannot concentrate on driving.

### Seizures/blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when playing videos or games. These may occur even if a person has never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult your doctor before playing videos or games or enabling a flashing-lights feature (if available) on your mobile device.

Discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements or disorientation. It is always a good idea to hold the screen away from your eyes, leave the lights on in the room, take a 15-minute break every hour and stop use if you are tired.



























# Caution about high volume usage

Warning: Exposure to loud noise from any source for extended periods of time may affect your hearing. The louder the volume sound level, the less time is required before your hearing could be affected. To protect your hearing:



- Limit the amount of time you use headsets or headphones at high volume.
- Avoid turning up the volume to block out noisy surroundings.
  - Turn the volume down if you can't hear people speaking near you.

If you experience hearing discomfort, including the sensation of pressure or fullness in your ears, ringing in your ears or muffled speech, you should stop listening to the device through your headset or headphones and have your hearing checked. When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands. arms, shoulders, neck or other parts of your body. Keep your mobile device and its accessories away from small children.

These products are not toys and may be hazardous to small children. For example:

- A choking hazard may exist for small, detachable parts.
- Improper use could result in loud sounds, possibly causing hearing injury.
- Improperly handled batteries could overheat and cause a burn.

### Glass parts

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service centre.























# Operational warnings

Obey all posted signs when using mobile devices in public areas.

### Potentially explosive atmospheres

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often, but not always, posted and can include fuelling areas, such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities or areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain dust or metal powders.

When you are in such an area, turn off your mobile device and do not remove, install or charge batteries. In such areas, sparks can occur and cause an explosion or fire.

# Radio frequency (RF) energy

### Exposure to RF energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate using your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

Your mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

### RF energy operational precautions

For optimal mobile device performance, and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions:

- When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you
  would a landline phone.
- If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a
  Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case or body harness. If you
  do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola, keep the
  mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body
  when transmitting.
- Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of Motorola-supplied or approved accessories, visit our website at: www.motorola.com.

### RF energy interference/compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is subject to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances, your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

#### Follow instructions to avoid interference problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so.


























In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an aeroplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in-flight.

#### Implantable medical devices

If you have an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or defibrillator, consult your doctor before using this mobile device.

Persons with implantable medical devices should observe the following precautions:

- ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimetres (8 inches) from the implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON.
- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the mobile device immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your mobile device with your implantable medical device, consult your health care provider.

### Specific absorption rate (ICNIRP)

Your model wireless phone meets international quidelines for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organisation ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health, and to account for any variations in measurements. The guidelines use a unit of measurement known as the Specific absorption rate (SAR). The ICNIRP SAR limit for mobile devices used by the general public is two watts per kilogram (W/kg), and the highest SAR value for this mobile device when tested at the ear is 0.405 W/kg. As mobile devices offer a range of functions, they can be used in other positions, such as on the body as described in this guide. In this case, the highest tested SAR value is 0.775 W/kg. The tests are carried out in accordance with international guidelines for testing. The SAR information includes the Motorola testing

protocol, assessment procedure and measurement uncertainty range for this product.
























As SAR is measured utilising the mobile device's highest transmitting power, the actual SAR of this mobile device while operating is typically below that indicated above. This is due to automatic changes to the power level of the mobile device to ensure it only uses the minimum level required to reach the network.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various mobile devices and at various positions, they meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the quidelines.
































### WARRANTY INFORMATION

Motorola guarantees to you, the original purchaser, the Personal Communicator and accessories which you have purchased from an authorised Motorola dealer (the "Products"), to be in conformance with the applicable Motorola specifications current at the time of manufacture for a different period of time from date of purchase of the Products) (warranty term).

The warranty period starts at the time of the Product(s) original purchase by the first end-user. The Product may consist of several different parts and different parts may be covered by a different warranty period (hereinafter "Warranty Period"). The different Warranty Periods are:


